



- Old Town, San Diego—the birthplace of Alta California, 1769
- 40 current and former elected and appointed state and local officials from 3 Californias
- Academic representatives
- Department of State/Relaciones Exteriores representatives

A Shared Vision

The three states of California, Baja California, and Baja California Sur comprise one ecological and economic region. They have strong historical and cultural ties that have existed for more than a century through trade, investment, labor flows, and personal connections created by tourism, migration, and family ties. In addition, all have an interest in preserving the shared fragile and unique ecology of mountains, deserts, and oceans, as well as building sustainable communities with sufficient water and local, renewable energy sources. The security and prosperity of the entire region is also important to the individual security and prosperity of each state.

The economy of the entire region depends on a transportation infrastructure that allows families and goods to move across the region efficiently and to cross the international border without the undue delays that are currently experienced.

Because of all these common interests, it is proposed that the three states enhance the cooperative relationship of their governments and existing public policies by creating an Institute of the Californias.

Shared Purpose and Goals

- Build Strong and Resilient Communities
 consistent with Pillar IV of the Mérida Initiative
- Enhance tri-state collaboration, especially of the local and state governments and academic sector
- Facilitate sharing of best practices among the three states, emphasizing community engagement
- Implement collaborative initiatives to improve public safety, advance sustainable economic development, and improve social and cultural institutions focused on concrete projects with measurable results

Founding Meeting: Conclusions

- Consensus reached to move ahead with the initiative
- BC and BCS will establish non-profits under Mexican law; CA will utilize the mechanism of SDSU's non-profit
- Participants at the Old Town meeting will be the core group and each state's delegation will add members as convenient

Founding Meeting: Conclusions

- The draft Mission Statement was agreed upon
- A strategic focus was developed to guide specific areas of work as funding becomes available:
 - Society and public security
 - Economic development and sustainable tourism
 - Education, research, and culture
 - Public health
 - Environmental quality and risks
 - Capacity building for public sector professionals

Next Steps

Priority Projects

- 3 Californias disaster preparedness, response, and recovery; immediate focus on developing clear protocols to facilitate international donations
- Capacity building for public sector professionals through a joint course of study leading to a Master's degree
- Trainings for state and local officials on shared environmental issues
- Strategic analysis of socio-economic and environmental issues of the 3 Californias to help prioritize actions of the Institute
