





## Welcome to "Ufugi Nature Museum"!

The beautiful Yambaru forest is a treasure we must hand down to posterity. The Yambaru Wildlife Conservation Center, "Ufugi Nature Museum," was opened in 1999 with the aim of raising public awareness so that visitors can deepen their understanding of and interest in the nature and wildlife of the Yambaru area as well as promoting projects, research and surveys for conservation of valuable natural environment and wildlife in Yambaru. In 2010, it was reopened as it renewed the exhibition, and it was also given the nickname "Ufugi Nature Museum."



## The region "Yambaru"

"Yambaru" originally meant "a region with a range of mountains and extensive forests" and referred to the area all over the northern part of Okinawa Island. Nowadays, the natural forest and its riches have gradually been reduced to a narrow area. And the dense forests, especially, which endemic species such as the Okinawa Rail, Okinawa Woodpecker etc. still inhabit, remain in only three northern villages; Kunigami, Ogimi, and Higashi village.
