

WILL REST TO-DAY IN GREENWOOD.

Justice Blatchford's Body Transported Last Night from Newport.

NEWPORT, R. I., July 11.—Funeral rites over the remains of the late Associate Justice Samuel Blatchford of the United States Supreme Court were performed at 2:30 this afternoon. All Saints' Chapel, which has been the scene of so many splendid weddings, was to-day the scene of a more solemn ceremony. The plain little structure in which society worships during the Summer months was crowded, while the streets around were filled with spectators and carriages. The floral pieces were numerous and costly.

No services were held at the late residence in Greenough Place. The casket was taken directly to the church, where the Right Rev. Bishop Potter, a relative of the late Justice, officiated, assisted by the Right Rev. Bishop Clarke of Rhode Island, the Rev. Dr. H. Y. Satterlee, and the Rev. Dr. Alexander Mackaye Smith of New-York.

The funeral party was driven from the church to the deck of the steamer General, and upon her transported to Wickford, leaving at 4:20 P. M. A special parlor car was in waiting for the party. The body will be transferred to the undertaker's rooms to-night, and will be interred to-morrow morning in Greenwood Cemetery.

HOLDS PIDCOCK'S PAPER.

The Somerset County Bank Loaned Money to Its Directors Illegally.

SOMERVILLE, N. J. July 11.—Calvin Corle, who was President of the Somerset County Bank, which recently failed, made a statement to-day concerning the finances of the bank. He said:

"The deposits last Friday night, when the bank closed, amounted to \$140,000; cash on hand \$15,000; surplus over money not paid, \$10,500; borrowed money by bank, \$55,000. Notes amounting to \$10,000 were sent to New-York. The bank owes \$5,000 to correspondent banks outside of New-York City. The bank holds Pidcock's paper to the amount of \$84,000. Five thousand dollars was paid on this account one week ago. The whole amount of the Directors' paper held by the bank amounts to \$134,000.

The Somerset County Bank was incorporated under the laws of New-Jersey March 2, 1848. One of the articles of the charter reads as follows: "That no loans or discounts shall ever be made by the said bank on the stock, note, or notes of any stockholder or Director, nor on any note or notes that may be drawn by one Director and indorsed by any other Director."

Government Silver Purchases.

WASHINGTON, July 11.—There was but one response to Acting Director Preston's counter proposition to the silver brokers yesterday, and that was limited to an offer of 100,000 ounces of silver at 71½ cents per ounce. This came from New-York by telegraph after the close of the office yesterday, and was promptly accepted.

To-morrow another effort will be made to secure more silver, and as the price in London this morning was up ½d. to 33½d., it may be that the department will have to pay more than 71½ if it decides to buy at all. It is stated that the purpose of the Acting Director of the mint just now is to secure steady quotations rather than to affect the market one way or another, and when the quotations have become steadier, it is probable that the purchases of silver will be resumed in larger amounts.

Three New Cases of Typhus.

Three new cases of typhus fever were reported yesterday. They were: Patrick Hansen, thirty-two years old, who was removed from 50 Varick Street to Bellevue; John Burns, twenty years old, to Chambers Street Hospital, and Joseph Kelly, twenty-seven years old, no home, to Bellevue.

Carl Ismar, thirty-seven years old, died at Bellevue, and Patrick Harrity, thirty-five years old, died at Gouverneur Hospital of typhus fever yesterday.
