

JUSTICE BLATCHFORD'S WILL.

**It Disposes of Personal Property and
Real Estate Valued at \$460,000.**

The will of Justice Samuel Blatchford of the United States Supreme Court, who died at his Newport home July 7, was filed for probate yesterday by his son, Samuel A. Blatchford. The will was drawn June 15, 1876, the executors being the Judge's son and Judge Sedgwick. The witnesses were Francis M. Bangs, Charles W. Bangs, and William Nassau.

Judge Blatchford leaves \$100,000 to Mrs. Rachel Bliss Beckwith of New-Haven, Conn., a daughter of the Rev. Henry Hunter, and \$20,000 to Cordelia F. Green of Milford, Mass. His widow, Caroline Frances Blatchford, gets the furniture of the house at Newport, the pictures and bric-a-brac alone being valued at over \$5,000, and the income of half her husband's estate for life. His son gets the income of half the residuary estate, valued at \$175,000, and the copyright of Judge Blatchford's law works, valued at \$2,000. The personal property of the deceased is valued at \$350,000.

The realty, valued at \$110,000, is divided between the widow and son. When the widow dies, one-third of her share of the realty goes to Rachel B. Beckwith; one-third to Julia Maria Potter, and the remaining third to Sophia Ethelinda Blatchford.

Harris Will Be Buried To-morrow.

John Harris, the Williamsburg leather merchant who died suddenly at the Revere House Wednesday morning, will be buried to-morrow in Cypress Hills Cemetery. The funeral services will be held at his late home, 75 Conselyea Street. The Rev. Frederick Griffin of St. Saviour's Protestant Episcopal Church, Maspeth, will officiate.

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
