A LOOK AHEAD A LOOK BACK

DA's priorities for the coming year entail both finishing initiatives that were stalled by the Reagan/Bush Administrations and introducing new measures to strengthen America both economically and socially.

After 12 years of not-very-benign neglect, the time has finally come to pass some of the legislation that has been bogged down. Much of the early part of the first session of Congress will be concerned with many of these initiatives, and ADA will be a part of these debates. We will be working for the Family Medical Leave Act, twice vetoed by George Bush, reversing the "gag rule", easing voter registration and increasing voter turnout through passage of the Motor-Voter bill. Initiatives such as these, with which ADA members have been active for many years, are finally likely to see action this year.

Moreover, our long term economic problems will finally be examined in a more open and positive fashion. President-elect Clinton has proposed many of the initiatives suggested by Harvard Professor Robert Reich, who has been a part of many ADA conventions. The investment necessary in our domestic economy is likely to take center stage, and ADA has a detailed, fiscally sound program ready. Among other things we will be working for are an increase of \$50 billion per year for infrastructure investment, a \$25 billion increase

in education funds, and a substantial increase in funding for the Jobs Training Partnership Act to train young people for productive jobs. Much of the needed funding can be gotten through judicious downsizing of the military and a real commitment to economic conversion and industrial policy. All of these initiatives, which have been part of ADA's program for many years, have a real chance to be addressed in 1993.

Perhaps the most important issue for the country that will probably see action in the next year or two is health care. ADA has long

The ADA voting record provides an opportunity to look back on our accomplishments in 1992 as we look forward to a new, more productive 1993. The past year has brought many highs and lows to ADA. Breaking the Republican dominance of Presidential elections, a successful voter registration and Get Out The Vote Drive that registered about 91,000 new young voters and identified many young activists, a strong presence on Capital Hill that led to victories on many important legislative issues, and an active involvement in elections across the country are among the highlights of the past year. We also must remember with sadness the passing of three giants of American liberalism. Earlier in the year, we lost an ADA founder and the man who led the battle against McCarthyism, Jim Loeb. Later in the year, Joe Rauh, Jr., an ADA founder and one of our leading lights, and Rep. Ted Weiss, a past President of the organization and a man often called "The Conscience of the House of Representatives", passed away. Despite these moments of sadness, 1992 has provided us with every reason to have hope for the future and pride in our accomplishments.

The 1992 ADA Voting Record is an example of the mixed emotion we have about this year. Although the averages for the House and Senate are considerably higher than in years past, we must recognize that a quarter of our

votes were failed veto override attempts, which tend to be highly partisan. Nonetheless, we must assume that with a more friendly Executive Branch, we will not need to override vetoes to bring about such important changes as campaign finance reform, family and medical leave, the "motor-voter" bill to ease voter registration, and family planning issues. These can easily move from the moral victory of passage in the Congress to the real victory of enacting legislation.

Yet, when one looks at the programmatic achievements of the 102nd Congress, there is definite disappointment. A wide range of

SENATE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

1.SEPARATION OF CHURCH AND STATE S.
2. Hatch (R-UT) amendment to authorize \$30 million for six demonstration projects to provide low-income parents with educational certificates for the cost of enrolling their child at the public or private school of their choice, including religiously affiliated schools. Rejected 36-57: Jan. 23, 1992. A "nay" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

2.CONDITIONAL MFN FOR CHINA IN 1992 - VETO OVERRIDE H.R. 2212. Passage, over the President's veto, of the bill to prohibit the President from granting most-favored-nation (MFN) status to China for the 12-month period beginning July 3, 1992, unless he reports that China has made significant progress in preventing human rights abuses, remedied unfair trade practices and limited weapons proliferation. Rejected 60-38 (A 2/3 majority of those present and voting, 66 in this case, is required to override a veto): March 18, 1992. A "yea" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

3.1992 TAX BILL - CONFERENCE REPORT H.R. 4210. Adoption of the conference report to create a 20 percent tax credit against Social Security taxes, replaced in 1994 by a permanent \$300-a-child tax credit, to be paid for by increasing the current top tax rate from 31 percent to 36 percent and imposing a 10 percent surtax on millionaires. Adopted 50-44: March 20, 1992. A "yea" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

4.ELIMINATE BUDGET FIRE WALLS - CLOTURE S. 2399. Mitchell (D-ME) motion to invoke cloture and proceed to the bill to modify the 1990 Budget Enforcement Act to knock down the walls that prohibit the shifting of funds between defense and domestic appropriations. Motion rejected 50-48 (60 votes are required to invoke cloture): March 26, 1992. A "yea" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

5.FISCAL 1993 BUDGET RESOLUTION S. Con.Res. 106. Bradley (D-NJ) motion to waive the 1974 Budget Act with respect to the Symms (R-ID) point of order against the Bradley amendment. The Bradley amendment would have cut \$7 billion in defense spending in 1993 and \$11 billion over each of the next four years, with half the savings to go to domestic programs and the rest to deficit reduction. Motion rejected 36-62: April 9,1992. (Subsequently, the chair sustained the Symms point of order, and the Bradley amendment fell.) A "yea" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

6.FISCAL 1993 BUDGET RESOLUTION - DEFENSE CUTS S. Con.Res. 106. Inouye (D-HI) motion to kill the Harkin (D-IA) amendment to reduce by \$6 billion defense budget authority in fiscal 1993, and if the budget fire walls were eliminated, transfer the funds to domestic programs. Motion agreed to 53-40: April 9, 1992. A "nay" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

7.CAMPAIGN FINANCE-VETO OVERRIDE S. 3. Passage, over the President's veto, of the bill to limit spending in Congressional campaigns by providing incentives to candidates to agree to voluntary spending limits, limiting PACs and restricting "soft money". Rejected 57-42 (A 2/3 majority of those present and voting, 66 in this case, is required to override a veto): May 13, 1992. A "yea" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

8.STRIKER REPLACEMENT BILL S. 55. Mitchell (D-ME) motion to invoke cloture on the committee substitute to allow employers to permanently replace striking workers if the employers agreed to accept third-party mediation and the workers did not. Motion rejected 57-42 (60 votes required to invoke cloture): June 16, 1992. A "yea" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

9.BALANCED BUDGET AMENDMENT S. 2733. Motion to invoke cloture on the Seymour (R-CA) amendment to propose a Constitutional amendment prohibiting deficit spending unless a three-fifths majority of Congress approves a specific deficit amount or there is a declaration of war or a declaration of national military emergency; require the president to submit a balanced budget each year; and require a three-fifths majority of both chambers of Congress to increase the public debt. Motion rejected 56-39 (60 votes are required to invoke cloture): July 1, 1992. A "nay" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

10.CAPITAL GAINS TAX CUT H.R. 11. Mack (R-FL) motion to waive the 1974 Budget Act with respect to the Bentsen (D-TX) point of order against the Mack amendment to the Urban Aid and Tax Bill. The Mack amendment would have cut the long-term capital gains tax rate to 15 percent. Motion rejected 37-57: Aug. 12, 1992. (Subsequently the chair upheld the Bentsen point of order, and the Mack amendment fell.) A "nay" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

11.ABORTION S. 3114. Coats (R-IN) amendment to strike the provisions of the Defense Authorization Bill that would allow U.S. military personnel and their families to obtain abortions at U.S. military bases overseas at their own expense. Rejected 36-55: Sept. 18, 1992. A "nay" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

12.MOTOR-VOTER REGISTRATION - VETO OVERRIDE S. 250. Passage, over the President's veto, of the bill to require states to permit voter registration simultaneously with applying for public certificates such as a driver's license, marriage license or hunting permit. Rejected 62-38 (A 2/3 majority of those present and voting, 67 in this case, is required to override a veto): Sept. 22, 1992. 4 "yea" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

13.FAMILY AND MEDICAL LEAVE - VETO OVERRIDE S. 5. Passage, over the President's veto, of the bill to require companies with more than 50 employees to provide workers with 12

weeks of unpaid leave for family emergencies. Passed 68-31 (A 2/3 majority of those present and voting, 66 in this case, is required to override a veto): Sept. 24, 1992. A "yea" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

14.FAMILY PLANNING - VETO OVERRIDE S. 323. Passage, over the President's veto, of the bill to reauthorize Title X of the Public Health Service Act for five years. The bill would overturn the "gag rule", thus allowing abortion counseling at federally funded family planning clinics. Passed 73-26 (A 2/3 majority of those present and voting, 66 in this case, is required to override a veto): Oct. 1, 1992. A "yea" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

15. NIH REAUTHORIZATION S. 2899. Motion to proceed to the bill to reauthorize and amend the programs of NIH through fiscal 1996, continuing the ban on research using tissue obtained from induced abortions until May 19, 1993, after which the ban would be lifted. Motion agreed to 85-12 (60 votes are required to invoke cloture): Oct. 2, 1992. A "yea" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

16.CABLE TELEVISION REGULATION - VETO OVERRIDE S. 12. Passage, over the President's veto, of the bill to cap basic cable rates and improve competition in the cable industry by having the FCC set rates for basic cable service and giving broadcasters the right to charge cable operators for the use of over-the-air signals. Passed 74-25 (A 2/3 majority of those present and voting, 66 in this case, is required to override a veto): Oct. 5, 1992. A "yea" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

17.FISCAL 1993 BUDGET RESOLUTION S. Con.Res. 106. Exon (D-NE) amendment to reduce the defense procurement accounts for smaller weapons projects by \$8.8 billion in budget authority and \$4.2 billion in outlays below the committee level for fiscal 1993. Rejected 45-50: April 9, 1992. A "yea" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

18. SDI S. 3114. Bumpers (D-AR) amendment to provide \$3.3 billion for the Strateg Defense Initiative in fiscal 1993, thus cutting \$1 billion from the committee bill and \$2.1 billion from the administration request. Rejected 48-50: Sept. 17, 1992. A "yea" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

19.STEALTH BOMBER S. 3114. Leahy (D-VT) amendment to cut \$2.7 billion from the Defense Authorization Bill for production of additional B-2 stealth bombers, halting production of the B-2 fleet at 15 planes instead of the 20 planes requested by the Administration. Rejected 45-53: Sept. 18, 1992. A "yea" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

20.NUCLEAR TESTING MORATORIUM S. 3114. Hatfield (R-OR) amendment to impose a nine-month moratorium on nuclear testing until July 1, 1993 and allow limited testing between July 1, 1993, and Jan. 1, 1997. Adopted 55-40: Sept. 18, 1992. A "yea" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

HOUSE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

1.ELIMINATE BUDGET WALLS - H.R. 3732. Passage of the bill to modify the 1990 Budget Enforcement Act to knock down the walls that prohibit the shifting of funds between defense, international and domestic appropriations. Rejected 187-238: March 31, 1992. A "yea" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

2.CAMPAIGN FINANCE REFORM - S. 3. Adoption of the conference report to limit spending in Congressional campaigns by providing incentives to candidates to agree to voluntary spending limits, restricting PACs and restricting "soft money" raised and spent by parties. Adopted 259-165: A "yea" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

3.FISCAL 1993 DEFENSE AUTHORIZATION - TROOPS IN EUROPE - H.R. 5006. Schroeder (D-CO) amendment to reduce the maximum number of military personnel in Europe to 100,000 by the end of 1995. Adopted 241-162: June 3, 1992. A "yea" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

4.DEFENSE INDUSTRY CONVERSION - H.R. 5006. Hopkins (R-KY) amendment to give the Secretary of Defense discretion in implementing the law requiring contractors to give hiring preferences and early retirement to Defense workers as a condition for future contracts. The amendment would also make training programs contingent on a study on the employment potential of Defense workers. Rejected 147-235: June 4, 1992. A "nay" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

5.FISCAL 1993 DEFENSE AUTHORIZATION - FUNDING LEVELS - H.R. 5006. Dellums (D-CA) amendment to reduce the total authorization in the bill by 10 percent. Rejected 90-283: June 4, 1992. A "yea" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

6.UNEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS EXTENSION-H.R. 5260. Passage of the bill to provide \$5.8 billion to extend until Jan. 1, 1993 the temporary extension of unemployment benefits for workers who exhaust their regular benefits. The bill would also make permanent changes so that extended benefits will automatically kick in during periods of high unemployment. Passed 261-150: June 9, 1992. A "yea" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

7.BALANCED-BUDGET AMENDMENT - H.J. Res.290. Passage of the joint resolution to propose a Constitutional amendment prohibiting deficit spending unless a three-fifths majority of both chambers approves a specific deficit amount or a declaration of war or national military emergency is enacted into law; require the President to submit a balanced budget each year; and require a three-fifths majority of both chambers to increase the public debt. Rejected 280-153 (A two-thirds majority of those present and voting, 289 in this case, is required to propose an amendment to the Constitution): June 11, 1992. A "nay" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

8.NATIONAL MOTOR-VOTER REGISTRA-TION - S. 250. Passage of the bill to require states to permit voter registration simultaneously with applying for public certificates such as a driver's license, marriage license or hunting permit. Passed 268-153: June 16, 1992. A "yea" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

9.COUNCIL ON COMPETITIVENESS - H.R. 5488. McDade (R-PA) amendment to eliminate the prohibition in the Treasury and Postal Service Appropriations Bill and allow the use of funds for the White House Council on Competitiveness, chaired by Vice President Dan Quayle. Rejected 183-236: July 1, 1992. A "nay" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

10.JAPANESE AUTO EXPORTS - H.R. 5100. Gephardt (D-MO) en bloc amendments to direct the U.S. Trade Representative to negotiate an agreement with Japan to enforce a yearly voluntary limit of 1.65 million automobile exports to the United States. Adopted 260-166: July 8, 1992. A "yea" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

11.HOME RULE/DOMESTIC PARTNERSHIP-H.R. 5517. DeLay (R-TX) motion to recommit the conference report on District of Columbia Appropriations to conference in order to include the Senate amendment to prohibit the DCgovernmnt from using any funds in the bill to extend employment, health or governmental benefits to homosexual or heterosexual unmarried couples (domestic partners) on the same basis that such benefits are extended to married couples. Motion agreed to 235-173: Sept. 24, 1992. A "nay" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

12.FISCAL 1993 DC APPROPRIATIONS - H.R. 5517. Dixon (D-CA) motion to rise from the Committee of the Whole and report the bill back to the House. Motion agreed to 231-181: July 8, 1992. (The bill was subsequently passed by voice vote.) A "yea" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

13.RUSSIAN AID - H.R. 4547. Passage of the bill to provide aid to the former Republics of the Soviet Union. The bill also increases the U.S. contribution to the International Monetary Fund by \$12.3 billion and includes other measures to boost aid to the former Republics. Passed 255-164: Aug. 6, 1992. A "yea" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

14.CONDITIONAL MFN FOR CHINA IN 1993 - VETO OVERRIDE - H.R. 5318. Passage, over the President's veto, of the bill to prohibit the President from waving the Jackson-Vanik amendment and extending most-favored-nation status to China in 1993 unless he certifies that China has released prisoners from the 1989 Tiananmen Square demonstrations and made significant progress in human rights and weapons non-proliferation. Passed 345-74 (A two-thirds majority, 280 in this case, is required to override a veto.): Sept. 30, 1992. A "yea" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

15.FAMILY AND MEDICAL LEAVE - VETO OVERRIDE - S. 5. Passage, over President Bush's Sept. 22 veto, of the bill to require companies with more than 50 employees to provide workers up to 12 weeks of unpaid leave for family emergencies. Rejected 258-169 (A two-thirds majority of those present and voting, 285 in this case, is required to override a veto): Sept. 30, 1992. A "yea" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

16.FAMILY PLANNING AMENDMENTS - VETO OVERRIDE - S. 323. Passage, over President Bush's Sept. 25 veto, of the bill to reauthorize Title X of the Public Health Service Act through fiscal 1997. The bill would overturn the Administration's "gag rule" and require women with unintended pregnancies to receive "non-directive counseling" on all options, including abortion. Rejected 266-148 (A two-thirds majority of those present and voting, 276 in this case, is required to override a veto.): Oct. 2, 1992. A "yea" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

17."OCTOBER SURPRISE" - H.Res. 585. Adoption of the resolution to provide for the completion of the activities of the task force to investigate allegations that the 1980 Reagan campaign conspired to delay the release of 52 American hostages in Iran until after the 1980 election so the Carter Administration would be unable to benefit from a pre-election hostage release, or "October Surprise." Adopted 221-181: Oct. 2, 1992. A "yea" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

18.ABORTION - S. 3144. Passage of the bill to allow military personnel and their dependents to receive abortions at overseas military facilities at their own expense. Passed 220-186: Oct. 3, 1992. A "yea" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

19.CABLE TELEVISION REREGULATION - VETO OVERRIDE - Passage, over President Bush's Oct. 3 veto, of the bill to cap basic cable rates and improve competition in the cable industry. Passed 308-114 (Two-thirds of those present and voting, 282 in this case, is required to override a veto.): Oct. 5, 1992. A "yea" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

20.FISCAL 1993 DEFENSE AUTHORIZATION - TROOPS OVERSEAS - H.R. 5006. Gephardt (D-MO) amendment to reduce by 40 percent below the fiscal 1992 level the number of U.S. military personnel stationed outside the United States by the end of fiscal 1995. The amendment provides for a waiver in the event of war or a Presidential declaration of an emergency. Adopted 225-177: June 3, 1992. A "yea" was a vote in support of the ADA position.

endorsed a single payer, universal health care system to eliminate the overlapping bureaucracies and waste in our current system. ADA President Senator Paul D. Wellstone (D-MN) will introduce legislation with this goal in mind. America currently spends more for health care than any other industrialized nation, yet ranks near the bottom of most measures of public health. A single payer system is the best way to assure lower costs and better health care for all Americans, and ADA will be leading that fight.

One of the first things the Clinton Administration will be moving to do is fill the many seats currently vacant on the federal bench. The Judiciary is overwhelmingly filled by Reagan/Bush appointees. If we are to fight the erosion of our civil rights and civil liberties, it is important that we work with the Clinton Administration to nominate and the Senate to confirm judges who have no ideological opposition to the very concept of civil liberties. We will be working, in cooperation with other groups like the Leadership Conference for Civil Rights and the Alliance for Justice, to expedite these appointments.

Our 1993 goals include a wide variety of issues. After the past twelve years, there is much to catch up on, and the time for change is now. All ADA members must be involved and in contact with their legislators if we are going to have the political strength to make the necessary changes in our country to have a healthier, more productive and stronger nation.

priority issues were discussed with little or no positive action. A variety of health care reform packages were introduced, but none could muster the support necessary to get to a vote. The Budget Enforcement Act, which prohibited shifting spending from an oversized defense budget to critical needs at home, continued to be in effect and we were unable to overturn it. Striker replacement and worker protection bills languished in Congress, lacking the support to override a certain Presidential veto. And, perhaps most wastefully, we spent a great deal of time defending against such long discredited ideas as the Balanced Budget Amendment to the Constitution and the capital gains tax cut for the wealthy. If we are to build on our successes of this year, we must be able to focus our energies on making positive change instead of fighting all too familiar reactionary proposals.

ADACTIVITIES

The past year also saw an increase in ADA's public activities, including publications, issue books, and media visibility. Booklets were published on Employment and Unemployment Issues, A Liberal Economic Policy and Program, and monthly reports on unemployment. By the end of 1992, we will also have published booklets on health care and energy issues. All of these are being published with an eye to the new Congress. We will be holding issue briefings for new Members and their staffs to familiarize them with the issues and the options for dealing with our nation's problems.

Our activities in this election year were also varied and exciting. Our activities at the Democratic National Convention, covered in the last issue of ADA Today, included distribution of issue books and buttons. During the campaign, the chapters distributed the buttons, bumper stickers, and a special newsletter on the election entitled Election '92, while each member was sent a postcard with 20 Reasons to Vote for Bill Clinton. The members in states with term limits on the ballot received a pamphlet opposing them, which refuted the arguments made by those supporting term limits. All of these activities helped remind the public of our need for a strong and active liberal community. This public presence, in turn, led to increased media focus on ADA and our issues. The issues we highlighted quickly became the battle ground for the campaign, as choice, economic conversion, and infrastructure investment became important parts of the Clinton campaign.

ADA/PAC also had a strong year, giving out 25% more money than in the last election cycle. As always, this money went overwhelmingly to non-incumbents. Among our victories, we are especially proud to welcome such liberals to Washington as Carol Moseley Braun, Russ Feingold, Barbara Boxer and Patty Murray in the Senate, and Bob Filner, Marjorie Mezvinsky, and others in the House. Though we are sad to see the loss of such liberal leaders as Les AuCoin, Jim Jontz, Peter Kostmayer and Joan Kelly Horn, our crop of new legislators must be seen as an opportunity to break the mold of the past few years.

TRAGEDIES

Despite this list of achievements, the look back at the year would not be complete without mentioning three great men who passed away this year. Jim Loeb was an ADA founder, and its first National Director. His commitment to liberalism set the tone for the organization for the next 45 years. By working to bring together the leading voices of his generation, he changed the outlook for succeeding generations.

Joe Rauh was more than just an ADA founder and leader in the battles we've fought. He was a symbol of the courage and conviction that ADA members everywhere show in their activities. From his 1948 battle for a civil rights plank in the Democratic platform, through his battles with McCarthyism, to his leading role in opposing the Vietnam War, and all the way to his staunch opposition to Robert Bork and Clarence Thomas, Joe Rauh was a mentor, friend and role model for three generations of activists. Though his achievements are too numerous to count, Joe never rested on his laurels. His greatest victory was always the next one, and his conviction that there would be a next victory was the spark that lit our fires.

Ted Weiss first came to prominence as a leader of the New York democratic reform movement. An immigrant, he came to love his adopted country and make its ideals his own. The promise of equal justice under the law and the commitment to making us a land of opportunity for all were the guiding lights of his actions. Whether this meant fighting demagoguery on the flag burning issue, fighting the erosion of social services that provide hope for all, or working to strengthen civil liberties and civil rights protections, Ted never let expedience get in the way of honor. His dedication to ADA, as an active member and as a President of the organization, showed all of us what dedication can mean to a national organization.

In The Ethics of the Fathers, a book of ancient Jewish proverbs, there is the admonition that it is not incumbent upon one to finish the great works, but neither is one free to disassociate oneself from those works. These three giants, who did not live to see all of their works for liberal causes come to fruition, nonetheless show us how much can be accomplished if we apply ourselves to those causes.

youth voter registration drive. More than 91,000 young voters were registered to vote, and this effort was followed up by an effort to ensure that they actually showed up on election day. This effort also identified many young activists who will be the leaders of the future. Named after the great civil rights leader and former ADA President Allard K. Lowenstein, this effort provided us with an opportunity to influence those who will be making policy,

both for ADA and the nation, for years to come.

All of these projects came together into a very effective year for ADA. The challenge of the year ahead, both for the organization and for liberals in general, will be to build on these victories and learn from our losses to ensure that our future is more successful than our past year.
