Introduction

This is the second report for the 2021 Isle of Man Census. Included in this report are detailed employment figures and household statistics, detailing the number of residents in different categories of employment and the various types of household on the Isle of Man.

Any additional analysis relating to this census and historical information relating to previous censuses will be made available at the same address.

Further analysis may be conducted or made available, subject to practicality and confidentiality. Any requests for additional information should be made to Statistics Isle of Man at the Isle of Man Government Cabinet Office.

Methodological Note

The 2021 Census was the first census on the Isle of Man to have employed a 'digital first' strategy. Under this strategy, households were sent a unique code that enabled them to complete their census return using an online form developed especially by the Isle of Man Government's Technology Service.

Alternative methods of completing a census return were made available to those who were unable or preferred not to use the online system. These included: being issued a paper copy of the form; completing the census over the phone; and completing the census in-person at the census office.

In total, 5,508 paper household forms were submitted to the Census Office, representing 14.8% of all household responses received. This compares with the 2016 Census, which also had an online option, in which 80% of all responses were by means of paper forms.

The aim of this strategy was to reduce the reliance of the census on paper documents, and hence also the associated costs and waste associated with printing, postage, and storage, while also increasing both the reliability of the data and the ease with which the census results could be analysed.

In addition to the different ways of completing a census return that were made available, a team of field officers visited properties from which no response had been received. The role of these officers was to encourage and, if desired, assist people to complete their census return and identify residential properties as being vacant.

During the later stages of the Census, a number of procedures were adopted to ensure accuracy of the results. In particular:

 Households in which one spouse, partner, or civil partner appeared to have been missed off the census response were contacted to ascertain whether that person should have been included at that property.

- People who appeared to be duplicated at two or more properties were contacted to determine whether this was the case and, if so, establish which property they normally occupied.
- Figures were regularly assessed against other sources of data, such as the school role, birth records, and employment statistics to identify any underrepresented demographics early on. Through this process it was determined that no imputation of additional people (such as that carried out for the 2016 Census) was necessary.

Fuller methodological and operational details will be provided in a subsequent review of the Census project.

KEY ECONOMIC & HOUSEHOLD STATISTICS

Household Size and Composition

- The average household size has continued to fall since 2016, dropping from 2.28 to 2.22 people per household.
- This compares with an estimated figure of 2.36 for the United Kingdom as a whole and is most similar to the estimated average household size for the North East of England, which is 2.24.
- In particular, there has been a marked increase in the number of single person households, which has risen by 13% since 2016, and a smaller increase of 4.9% in that of two person households. By contrast, the numbers of households consisting of three and four people decreased by 5.1% and 1.5% respectively.
- As a result of the continued trend towards smaller households, the number of households has increased more than perhaps would be expected from the relatively modest population growth would, rising from 35,763 households in 2016 to 37,220 households.

Employment Trends

- The number of employed residents in the category 'Managers, Directors, and Senior Officials' has risen from 4,904 in 2011 to 5,324 in 2021. The percentage of these who are women has risen slightly from 33.4% to 37.5%.
- The number of people employed in Banking has fell over the past ten years. While Banking 2,282 people in 2016, this fell to 1,851 in 2021. The number of people working in Agriculture, Forestry, and Fishing also fell, from 810 to 664.
- Two sectors which showed significant growth in employment numbers are eGaming and Information and Communication Technology. The number of employees in the former rose from 658 in 2016 to 1,086 in 2021.
- At 9,934, the number of people working in the public sector¹ in 2021 is similar to that recorded in 2011 (10,042). In both years this represents approximately 23% of the population. In 2016, the same figure was 9,144, accounting for approximately 22% of the working population.

Transport and Car Ownership

- The number of cars available for use by households has increased by 6.9% since 2011, while the same figure for motorcycles has increased by just 2%.

¹ This includes people working in schools and hospitals, for organizations such as the Isle of Man Post Office, and employees of local authorities.

- The number of people travelling to work by driving or as a passenger in a private vehicle fell 7% since 2011, while that of people using public transport fell 20.5%. These figures may however reflect an increased tendency to work from home or, in the case of public transport, concerns relating to the COVID-19 pandemic. Indeed, the number of people reporting that they worked mainly from home increased by 100.5% on the figure for 2011, rising from 1,944 people to 3,898.
- Those travelling to work by means of a bicycle or on foot both rose. The number of people cycling to work increased from 406 in 2011 to 598, while those travelling on foot increased slightly from 5,737 to 5,860.

Alternative Energy Sources

- 5.8% of households reported that their property was equipped with at least one form of alternative energy technology such as solar panels or a charge point for an electric car.
- Of these, heat pumps and solar panels were the most common types. The former is present in 2.1% of households, and 1.7% are equipped with the latter.
- Of traditional sources of energy, gas is the most common fuel used for central heating and is used by 50% of households. Oil, the next most common fuel, is used in 39.4% of households.

Home Ownership

- Compared with 2011, there has been a marked increase in the number of homes that are owned outright by their occupants, rising from 33.7% of all households to 39.1%. The percentage of households renting in the private sector has also risen, from 16.1% to 18.2%.
- The number of households renting in the public sector has remained largely static, rising only 2% between 2011 and 2021.
- In contrast to this, the percentage of households buying their property through a mortgage or loan has fallen from 32.2% to 25.1%.


