### Summary

Constructed in 1914, the Bank of Avilla building is located at 205

Greenfield Street in Avilla, Jasper County, Missouri. The builder is unknown.

It is a brick one-part commercial block building with a flat roof that

measures twenty-five by forty foot. It sits at the intersection of Greenfield

and Lamar Streets near the center of the small town of Avilla, Jasper County,

Missouri. (Photo 2)

The main entrance is located in the clipped southeast corner of the building. (Photo 1) The property's most striking exterior feature is the elaborate classical door surround. The south and east elevations include two 1/1 wooden windows with non-historic metal hoods. The interior has been somewhat altered since the bank was converted into a post office in 1952. However, it still retains the vault, shelving, part of the lobby wall and lobby area. Other than some interior changes the building retains the majority of its historic character. (Figure F)

#### Setting

The former Bank of Avilla/Post Office sits in a primarily residential area now with homes on both east and west sides. There is a small Telephone Company office to the north. A gazebo in the town park and a building with murals around all sides sit to the south. Sidewalks flank the south and east sides and are historically associated with the former bank and with the property lines. (Figure C) The bank abuts the sidewalks on the south and east. A strip of grassy lawn is to the west. A larger grassy lawn is to the north behind the building and features a small satellite dish and propane tank. (Figure G).

The Bank of Avilla is a brick one-part commercial block building with a flat roof. The main entrance is located on the southeast corner (Photo 2). The frontispiece on the clipped corner entrance of the former bank shows the Tuscan order of the Classical style of architecture with its plain stone columns, entablature, and unadorned capitals (Photo 1). Below the cornice of the pediment is inscribed "1915". The frieze has engraved "Bank of Avilla" according to the former owner of the building. 1 This engraving is currently covered by the U.S. Post Office sign. An original wood three pane transom window sits above the front door. The metal front doors and 1/1 sidelight are non-historic. The commercial style is also reflected in its flat roof and little adornment other than what is shown on the frontispiece, as described above. There is limestone coping at the roofline. A new TPO (Thermoplastic Polyolefin) roof was added in 2019. The south (Photo 3) and east facades (Photo 4) of the building each feature two 1/1 double hung windows that are the original wood other than a wooden sash recently repaired with wood to match the original. The windows feature the original stone sills and lintels and have non-historic metal hoods. (Photo 10) The windows on the south façade have the wording "Post Office Avilla, Mo" painted above the windows on the lintel. The northern window on the east facade has a heavy screen placed over it, but the window is still in place and the screen is removable. (Photo 4) The west side of the building is blind and shows a stepped roof line and features the original chimney. There is a small air conditioning unit on this elevation. (Photo 5) The north side of the building has only a metal back door, covered with a heavy screen, for a private entrance. (Photo 6). A plain lunette and relieving arch rest above the back door and the transom has been infilled.

Dr. S.C. Cordonnier, one of the Directors of the former Bank moved to Carthage, Missouri in the 1930's. The locals missed having a doctor, so the Board of the Bank had a twelve by thirty-two foot addition built on to the west side of the bank building so the Doctor could be in town one or two days a week.<sup>2</sup> Dr. Cordonnier died May 16, 1939. The addition was removed in the 1980's, leaving the bank building standing as it was originally built.

### Interior Description

The entrance leads to a small lobby in the southeast corner, which is the only public space in the building. (Figure A). As shown in an old photo (Figure E) there was originally a cashier's window in the bank's lobby. After five bank robberies, which are described later in the nomination, bullet proof glass fixtures were installed in 1932.3 Presently in the public lobby area on the north wall there are two teller type windows with bars and windows that pull down, flanked by smaller stationary windows and a small stationary window above each teller window. (Photo 7) Two large textured stationary glass windows are on the same wall to the east. Part of the north lower lobby wall looks like the lobby wall in the old photo so it is possible that part of the original wall was retained. (Figure E). One teller-type window has been made handicap accessible. Newer post office boxes have been installed on the lobby west wall, (Photo 8) but the original post office boxes which feature combination locks are in possession of the building's current owner. There is also an older wooden door in the west wall. On the upper portions of the walls on the north and west sides are iron bars. (Photo 13)

When the Post Office lobby transitioned to a 24 hour service about the year 2012, plywood was installed behind the bars by the Postal Service as a security requirement. The southerly clipped corner portion of the interior lobby wall of the building has a window to one side of the entrance door and an original three-light transom window above the door. The original hardware for the transom window is attached. (Photo 9). There are also curved corners on the interior walls at the points of the clipped exterior corners of the building. (Photo 11). Only one curved corner is shown as one is in the area that was not allowed to be photographed. Going through the door on the west side of the lobby, one enters the main office. The main post office work area is open. In the northwest corner is the original bank vault and vault doors (Photo 12 and Figure D) with the James Baumann Safe Co., St. Louis, Missouri inscription and decoration in the corners of the vault door. "Bank of Avilla" is written in gold atop the vault door, though it is hard to see in the photo. The shelves from the former bank are still intact in the vault. Northeast of the main office area is an entryway to a former meeting room and a bathroom, which was added at some point. The former meeting room is used for storage. Postal privacy requirements prevented photography in the open office areas, so as not to show any mail. Only the vault photo was allowed. (Photo 12).

### Integrity

A new flat TPO (Thermoplastic Polyolefin) roof was installed in December 2019, maintaining the same look as before. The original brick on the building has only been painted a brick red color and tuck pointed as needed. Windows are the original wood and have only been repaired with wood and painted. Most of the interior moldings are original wood except for in the lobby. There have been some alterations to the North and West Lobby walls by the US Postal Service. A bathroom was installed but the date is unknown. The former meeting

room dates from the period of significance. The vault and lobby space retain their historic plans. The interior doors are either original or historic.

The Bank of Avilla building has retained integrity and charm. As a testament to its cultural significance a \$400.00 Preservation Award was given to the owners in 2014 by the Rt. 66 Association<sup>4</sup> and was used for tuck pointing to preserve the brick walls.

### Summary

The Bank of Avilla, 205 Greenfield Street, Avilla, Jasper County, Missouri is locally significant under Criterion A: Commerce for serving the area's farmers, townspeople, and merchants from 1915 to 1944. It was the only bank in the small town and played an important role in the development of the town and the area, being about 12 miles from Carthage and about 8 miles from Reeds and LaRussell. Its interesting history of bank robberies serves as a record of the Gangster Era during the 1920's and 1930's. After its closing, the United States Postal Service moved into the building in 1952, again serving the town of Avilla and the area for 69 years plus, at present. The period of significance reflects the bank's operation from 1915-1944.

### Narrative

Avilla, Missouri, the fourth-oldest village in Jasper County, Missouri was platted in 1858. It sat in the midst of a rich farming district and most families outside of town made their living by crop farming and stock production. There were also strawberries raised in the area. In 1874 Avilla consisted of a few stores, a hotel, two churches and a school. The population then was about 500.5 But by the 1930's and for most of its history the population has fluctuated between 150 and 200 people. At the time of the operation of the Bank of Avilla the town had at least one hotel, general and grocery stores, a farm implement dealership, barber shop, eating establishments, three churches, a school, doctor's office, post office, Lodge

Hall, blacksmith, and then a filling station. It was also home base to a small traveling carnival.

### Commercial Significance of the Bank of Avilla

The Bank of Avilla was the only bank ever in the small town. It was organized on September 18, 1914, and built by the end of the year, opening in January 1915. Bank examiners notes, minutes, and reports to the Board of the Bank showed a consistently growing and profitable enterprise. From resources of about \$16,000.00 early in 1915, the bank grew to almost \$75,000.00 in resources in August 1923.7 Earnings became less stable, but the bank never showed a net annual loss during the period 1923-1929. According to reports filed with Missouri's Finance Department, the Bank of Avilla had resources of \$75,089.04 in 1925, \$85,539.94 in 1926, and \$76,325.79 in 1927. Most loans were farm related and included loans on land and chattel loans on cattle, horses, mules, cows, pigs, sheep, crops, fertilizer and farm machinery. There are also mentions in a letter to the bank examiner dated May 1, 1926 of a loan for an individual who had a threshing business and also a loan to an oil truck owner who had a contract to furnish twenty-one trucks for highway work in addition to his regular oil truck run.8

A study done by the Red Cross on January 13, 1921, indicated that one-third of Avilla students went to other towns to High School. 9 On May 1, 1926 the Board subscribed \$100.00 for organizing a Job Plan High School in Avilla, proving their commitment to the Avilla community. In 1928 the Board quit

making loans outside of regular patrons. In 1930 the Bank hypothecated \$2,000.00 in bonds in order to be on par list of the Federal Reserve Bank. <sup>10</sup>

Lillian Ullom, daughter of Ivy Russell, former cashier of the bank stated that when President Roosevelt closed the banks during the Depression, Russell would open the bank for an hour each afternoon just to make change for the local merchants. 11 The Bank of Avilla was eventually allowed to reopen without restrictions. 12 An article from the Carthage Evening Press on October 20, 1939 on the Bank of Avilla's Silver Anniversary notes,

Over the period of twenty-five years, times, good and bad, war, drouths [sic], pestilence, business recessions, periods of high prices and inflation, unemployment and depressions, our bank, with a most humble beginning, has withstood all these conditions and through the confidence of the people in the community has bank with more than one hundred twenty thousand dollars in total resources, offering the community an efficient banking service. 13

A Condensed Official Statement of the Bank of Avilla that appeared in the Joplin Globe on July 8, 1944, noted the following resources on June 30 of each of the following years; 1940-\$116,217.96, 1941-\$134,332.13, 1942-\$177,207.08, 1943-\$299,646.41, 1944-\$375,559.59.14 After 25 years of association with the Bank of Avilla, Ivy E. Russell, who was the majority stockholder and cashier, sold his interest in the Bank to C.H. Goppert of the

People's Bank of Kansas City. Having decided to run for a county office, Russell terminated his service with the Bank on August 31, 1944. The Lockwood Luminary reported the sale of the Bank of Avilla to the Bank of Carthage on November 16, 1944 with deposits of \$390,000.00 and describing it as one of the sturdiest rural banks of the country, coming through the depression with flying colors, one of the few strictly country banks to do so. 16

The Bank served the Avilla area not only as a lending institution but as a place to pay property taxes. The County Collector brought his books to rural areas such as the bank, so citizens would not have to travel the twelve mile distance to Carthage to pay their taxes. 17 This was the custom for a period during the twenties. It also supported social functions as a place to buy tickets to events like the Ozark State Fair and the Southwest Missouri Fair at Carthage, Mo. 19

### History of the Bank of Avilla

Samuel Salyer was the first cashier of the Bank. Ivy E. Russell became the cashier in 1919.<sup>20</sup> The colorful history of the Bank of Avilla includes five bank robberies between 1920 and 1939. A September 23, 1920 *Carthage Press* account describes the first robbery by a man named Robinson in the amount of \$1,600.00. After a three hour pursuit Red Oak, Mo. citizens caught the robber.<sup>21</sup>

The second robbery was reported in the *Carthage Evening Press* on February 20, 1925. A gang estimated at six men worked for one and one-half hours first attempting unsuccessfully to dig under the bank wall to the vault and then trying to load the bank safe onto a truck. Carthage, Missouri officers arrived on the scene and the bandits fled. The robbers had obtained about \$15.00 in small change that was outside the safe. It was reported that there was about \$1,800.00 in the safe that remained at the scene.<sup>22</sup>

The third robbery, as told in the *Carthage Evening Press* on August 14, 1931, relates how the bank safe weighing 3,200 pounds was hauled off successfully. This time the safe was loaded on a truck with a winch shortly before daybreak. Three Springfield, Missouri officers who answered the burglary call found the truck broken down two and one-half miles east of Halltown, Missouri. After a chase, area farmers were responsible for capturing the burglars.<sup>23</sup> The robbers charged were members of the Bruton-Pendleton Gang.<sup>24</sup>

The Carthage Evening Press account of robbery number four, dated May 19, 1932, and the only successful robbery up to this time, cited that a man held up and robbed the Bank of Avilla of \$3,000.00 in the afternoon. The cashier was taken hostage, bound and thrown out of the car near a farm west and north of Avilla. This robbery was described in Lisa Livingston-Martin's book Missouri's Wicked Route 66, along with a picture of the former Bank of

Avilla.26 Major Taylor of the notorious Irish O'Malley Gang was convicted of this robbery and the Bank of Jasper, Missouri robbery. He received a seventyfive year sentence for robberies of the two banks.<sup>27</sup>

Although it did not receive the same degree of local newspaper coverage, the last Bank of Avilla robbery was reported in the St. Louis Globe Democrat on January 15, 1939 in connection with robberies of nine Post Offices and three automobile thefts in Missouri and Oklahoma. $^{28}$  Another account in the St.Louis Post-Dispatch on May 6, 1939 reported that the FBI wanted the four robbers for 100 separate crimes, including eleven bank and post office robberies.29

The Bank of Avilla was sold in November of 1944 to the Bank of Carthage and closed. The United States Postal Service began leasing the building in 1952, continuing to serve the citizens of Avilla, the surrounding area and those who travel the historic Route 66. An article in the Carthage Press in 1976 written by Marvin VanGilder highlighted and pictured the Bank/Post Office and described the Bank of Avilla building as an "impressive structure and a successful bank" as part of a series of articles about the town of Avilla on its 100th Anniversary.  $^{30}$  The Post Office survived an attempted closure by the Postal Service in 2011 when citizens in the community and the Rt. 66

Association of Missouri mounted a campaign to keep the Post Office open. 31 The Post Office continues to operate four hours per day at this time.

The Bank with its preserved architecture is pictured in a book on Jasper County by Marvin VanGilder.<sup>32</sup> Jim Hinckley featured a full size color picture of the former bank and referred to it in one of his books as the "most notable" structure in Avilla.<sup>33</sup> Mr. Hinckley also talked about the Bank of Avilla/Post Office as being "most notable" in another book and included a building photo.<sup>34</sup>

The owners of the building received a \$400.00 preservation award in 2014 from the Route 66 Association of Missouri for their continuous interest in maintaining the historic building for viable community use by not only Avilla residents but also the people traveling the Missouri Historic Route 66 Byway. The building was also referred to as a cultural icon in the article. <sup>35</sup> The Bank of Avilla/Post Office is also featured in a Route 66 Magazine article about memories of Route 66, <sup>36</sup> and in an article on the ghost town of Avilla. <sup>37</sup> Conclusion

In conclusion, the Bank of Avilla opened in 1915 and served the community and area well for almost 30 years making land and chattel loans and loans to merchants, farmers and townspeople, surviving the Great Depression

and multiple bank robberies. It is commercially significant to the community as it was the only bank in the small town and was relied upon by many in Avilla and the surrounding area until its closure in 1944. While this nomination does not pursue Criterion C: Architecture, the bank of Avilla is an attractive property, being the only brick building of its age surviving in the community. It has caught the eye of authors and travelers of Route 66.






Former Bank of Avilla, Now Avilla Post Office Not To Scale


