More Traffic Delays Expected

Highway Work Set On 3 New Projects

Construction will start soon on three additional Queens highway improvement contracts slated for completion late in 1963 in anticipation of traffic to the 1964-65 World's Fair in Flushing Meadow Park. The combined jobs will cost over \$15 million. The announcement was made yesterday by Triborough Bridge and Tunnel Authority Chairman Robert Moses. The New York State Department of Public Works is constructing the highway program of arterial facilities in Queens with federal aid. The three new contracts affect the Whitestone parkway bridge, Grand Central parkway in Jamaica and the Van Wyck

expressway interchange in Kew Gardens. THE THREE new contracts are: 1—Construction of a bridge over the Flushing River to carry the new four-lane southbound roadway of the Whitestone expressway into the Northern boulevard interchange. Upon completion of the new bridge, the Whitestone parkway bridge over Flushing River will be rebuilt as a one-way bridge to serve the Whitestone expressway northbound traffic. The work will cost \$5,000,000. It is part of the interstate system and will be paid for with 90 per cent federal and 10 per cent state highway aid. 2—GRAND CENTRAL parkway from 150th to 172nd streets, Jamaica, will be widened from four to six lanes as part of the reconstruction of the parkway between Brooklyn-Queens expressway and Clearview expressway. Between Parsons boulevard and 164th place, the present express roadways will be depressed and widened, extending partially under the existing service roads. A reinforced concrete deck structure reaching out over the parkway will support the service roads. The work will cost \$6,780,593 and will be shared equally by the federal and state governments. During construction, traffic initially will be maintained on the existing parkway and later, on the service roads. 3—WORK ALSO will start on the Kew Gardens interchange of the Van Wyck expressway extension. The job involves the construction of viaducts carrying the present expressway over Union turnpike and Grand Central parkway on a viaduct northward to a new right of way along the easterly side of Flushing Meadow Park. Direct connections with Interboro parkway are to be provided. The construction will cost \$4,073,495, provided by federal and state funds on a 50-50 basis. Provision has been made to maintain all present traffic lanes during peak hours. The roadways will be narrowed between 10 A.M. and 3:30 P.M. when required by construction operations. Moses advised motorists that although extensive provisions have been made for moving traffic through the construction sites in all contracts involved in the program, the unprecedented volume of work will occasionally result in delays. He recommended that drivers familiarize themselves with alternate routes.

GI Families to Get Allotment Checks

WASHINGTON (AP)—The families of some 14,000 U. S. soldiers can expect to receive December allotment checks within the next week, even though they were ordered late. The Army said yesterday that its finance center at Ft. Benjamin Harrison, Indianapolis, is mailing checks at the rate of 1,500 to 2,000 a day to the families of men who made late requests. All of them should be in the dependents' hands by Dec. 13, an Army spokesman said.

Didn't Keep Right

Hall Faces Traffic Court

Gus Hall, the Communist leader who didn't keep to the right, was scheduled to appear in court today to answer three traffic violations. Hall, who faces federal action for failing to register with the Justice Department as an agent of a foreign power, was stopped while driving to Yonkers, Dec. 1. He was charged with failing to keep to the right, driving without a New York State operator's license, and driving with improper registration. Hall, along with party leaders Elizabeth Gurley Flynn and Ben Davis, failed to register with the Justice Department by the midnight, Nov. 30 deadline. For each day they fail to register, each faces a five year jail sentence and a \$10,000 fine. THE three are the only officers left after a recent shakeup of the Communist high command. The shakeup followed the Justice Department deadline, in a move apparently to leave as few Communists as possible susceptible to legal action. Regular party members have until Dec. 20 to register. Hall, who was scheduled to make an address at Cornell University in Ithaca tonight, said yesterday he may not be able to make it and that Mrs. Flynn would speak.

Tow Case

Police Sgts. Deny Charges

Three veteran Queens police sergeants denied yesterday they extorted money from a Flushing tow truck operator. The sergeants took the witness stand in Queens County Court, where they are on trial, to enter their denials. The case was in its seventh day before Acting County Judge Edward Thompson and an all-male jury. Testifying they neither threatened the towman nor took money from him were Gino Tenaglia, 39, of 43-30 48th street, Sunnyside, a 15-year veteran; oe Plotkin, 48, of 61-31 Little Neck parkway, Little Neck, on the force 20 years, and Clarence Heller, 55, of 29-24 214th street, Bayside, a veteran of 23 years.

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Toy Gun Heist Ends in Arrest

A \$75-a-week wine salesman was arrested yesterday three hours after police said he robbed a swank Manhattan department store of \$2,400 at the point of a toy gun. Robert Rhoades, 31, of Fresh Meadows, was nabbed by detectives as he returned to a parking lot across the street from the scene of the holdup, according to police. They said Rhoades was carrying the loot in a shopping bag when he was arrested shortly before 4 P. M. Detectives had staked out the lot on the theory that the bandit had been unable to reach his car while being chased after the robbery. The robbery of the Lord and Taylor store at 1440 Northern boulevard took place at 1 P. M. while the store was packed with lunch hour shoppers.

Reds Infiltrate American Industry

Assistant FBI Director William C. Sullivan said today that Communist agents are infiltrating American industrial and scientific meetings and collecting valuable military, scientific and industrial data. The FBI official, speaking at the second day of the 66th annual Congress of American Industry held by the National Association of Manufacturers, said Communist agents exploit the availability of technical and scientific information in newspapers, magazines, technical publications and even from the government printing office.

AFTER THE sergeants testified, the defense rested its case without calling other witnesses. Both sides will sum up today and Judge Thompson told the jurors the case will be put in their hands on day. The accusations were made by William K. Lade, operator of J and B Auto Body, 34-34 Linden place, and the payoffs of \$75 a month allegedly took place between July 1, 1959 and Jan. 1, 1960. Assistant District Attorney Frank Cacciatore of Astoria is the prosecutor.

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
