

Rev Sheehan Ordained In Eucharist At St. Rose

Timothy G. Sheehan, who has been serving for a year as a deacon at St. Rose of Lima R.C. Church in Rockaway Beach, was ordained on Saturday, January 31, at a Mass celebrated by Bishop Francis J. Mugavero.

About 400 people came to the church to witness the ceremony.

Concelebrants with the bishop in the Eucharist Celebration were the Rev. Karl Michel, pastor of St. Rose of Lima; the Rev. Francis McGee and the Rev. James Bradley, both of St. Rose, and the Rev. Emile Wcela, the Rev. George Denzer, the Rev. Francis Kilcoyne, the Rev. John Dobbyn, the Rev. James Fraser, the Rev. Thomas Sheridan, the Rev. Joseph Finerty and the Rev. Peter Swaisgood, O.S.B., all friends of Father Sheehan.

Father Sheehan will celebrate his first Mass on Sunday, February 8, at Cathedral College. It will be a Mass of Thanksgiving.

Lectors at the ceremony on Saturday were Michael Finn and Miss Dana Di Giorgio. Sister Evelyn Kelley, P.B.V.M., was commentator.

Sister Margaret Lipari, M.S.B.T.; Mr. and Mrs. James Haugh, and Bernard Keegan, extraordinary ministers, gave communion.

Sylvester O'Connor, organist, accompanied the adult choir of St. Rose of Lima Church, and the children's choir of the St. Rose of Lima School, under the direction of Sister Dorothy Volin, P.B.V.M., and the Spanish choir under the direction of Sister Helen Raynor, P.B.V.M.

Annoying of the hands was carried out by the bishop. Father Michel presented the candidate.

Father Sheehan is the son of Mrs. Laura Sheehan of Freehold, N.J., and the late Timothy Sheehan. He studied

Break In Hopper For Sr. Citizens

Congressman James H. Scheuer has introduced a tax reform proposal which he says would result in a \$250 income tax credit to each taxpayer housing a citizen 61 years of age or older.

"This bill is designed to provide financial support to those low and moderate-income families who wish to provide a home for their elderly parents or relatives," said Scheuer.

"There are many elderly persons who wish to remain in their communities, remain with their families, and who do not need or want institutional care which is heavily subsidized by the federal government," he continued. "Lack of modest sums of money often forces people into unnecessary, undesirable and expensive placement of the elderly outside the home."

"The \$250 of financial aid which this bill provides through a tax credit might well make it possible for a family to offer a home to an elderly relative."

Home Federal Assets At Peak

Home Federal Savings & Loan has surpassed \$338 million in assets.

Scheuer Aims Bill At Loophole In Acts Of War

Congressman James H. Scheuer has introduced legislation to close the loophole in the War Powers Resolution which allowed President Ford to authorize paramilitary activities in Angola without Congressional approval.

"The War Powers Resolution was enacted as a result of our Vietnam experience and Congress' difficulty in ending that invidious war. We wanted a mechanism to terminate an unauthorized war automatically. Obviously, we failed to cover the situation where civilian paramilitary activity was involved," he said.

Scheuer noted that CIA Director William Colby, in his testimony before the House Intelligence Committee, acknowledged the paramilitary nature of his agency's activities in Angola.

"Whether one favors or opposes involvement in Angola, what is important is that Congress exercise its Constitutional mandate on matters involving war and peace," he said.

Scheuer said too that his bill would amend the War Powers Resolution by making it applicable in cases in which agents or employees of the United States are engaged in hostilities in a foreign country or are advising military forces engaged in hostilities.

"Unless we remove this loophole, Angola may become a new prototype for our involvements in other foreign conflicts, since the President will be tempted to use this type of action rather than go to Congress for approval," said Scheuer.

Students also will be introduced to the most modern electric machines, and will have the opportunity to take practice Civil Service, school secretarial, and federal proficiency examinations.
