### Pizza, Who Slew Rival, Sent to Sing Sing by Downs

Carmine Pizza, 37, of 779 Hemlock street, Brooklyn, was sent to Sing Sing by Judge Thomas Downs in Queens County Court yesterday to serve 20 years to life.

Pizza was convicted of the slaying of Gabriel Bruno, 30, of 99-14 207th street, Bellaire, his wife's lover. Mrs. Julia Pizza was one of the state's witnesses against her husband.

According to the testimony, Pizza met Bruno and his wife at 148th street and Liberty avenue, Jamaica, on the night of Sept. 6 last. He drew a revolver and fired three shots. Bruno was fatally wounded and died three days later. In 1924 Pizza and his wife were con-

The campaign of Rockaway resiients for relief from the \$13,600,000 proceeding for acquiring the public beach in the peninsula will reach its climax Friday, when the Board of Estimate will hand down a decision in the matter which has been pending on its calendar for over a year. Two other Rockaway relief petitions, pertaining to assessments of approximately \$2,936,500 and \$1,398,000 respectively, will also be accorded definite action at the next board meet-

A large group of Rockaway civic. leaders yesterday sought to have the board lay the petitions over for a month, but they were confronted with the vigorous opposition of Acting Borough President John J. Halleran, who would not consent to such a lengthy adjournment.
