Meet Your Candidates



ROSENTHAL

The Star-Journal presents, as a public service, biographical sketches of the four candidates in the special election to be held Tuesday to fill the vacancy in Congress from Queens' 6th District. The district embraces part of central Queens and a large portion of the borough's North Shore. All residents of the 6th Congressional District who were eligible to vote in last fall's mayoralty election, or who have registered as voters since then, may vote in the special congressional election. The voting hours will be from 6 A.M. to 7 P.M.

Benjamin Rosenthal, Democrat-Liberal

Benjamin S. Rosenthal of Elmhurst, practicing attorney and expert on election law, is seeking public office for the first time as the Democratic-Liberal candidate for Congress. The 38-year-old chairman of the Queens Democratic Party's Law Committee was selected by the party's Executive Committee to run for the seat left vacant by the election of Congressman Lester Holtzman, Rego Park democrat, to the Supreme Court.

A resident of the district for 36 years, Rosenthal was graduated from P.S. 12, Woodside; Stuyvesant High School, Manhattan, and attended Long Island University and City College. He received his law degree from Brooklyn College in 1949 and his masters of law degree from New York University in 1952.

A World War II veteran, Rosenthal is active in many Queens civic, political, religious and fraternal organizations and served as a special deputy attorney general of the New York Election Frauds Bureau. Rosenthal has been directly endorsed by President Kennedy, and also Mayor Wagner and former U. S. Senator Herbert H. Lehman.

Last year Rosenthal was a member of the Queens organization's five-man committee for Wagner - Beame - Screvane, which directed the party's efforts in the successful city-wide mayoralty campaign.

Rosenthal has served as president of the Amerind Democratic Club, president of the Mens Club of the Jewish Center of Jackson Heights and vice-president of the Queens Lawyers Club division of the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies. He is vice-chairman of Borough President Clancy's Clear and Urban Redevelopment Committees.

Rosenthal and his wife, the former Lila Moskowitz, live at 88-12 Elmhurst avenue, Elmhurst. They have two children,

Thomas Galvin, Republican

A 35-year-old Flushing architect is seeking to build a career for himself... in politics.

Thomas F. Galvin is seeking public office for the first time as the Republican candidate for Congress. A resident of Queens since birth, Galvin was educated at St. Bartholomew's Elementary School, Elmhurst; Brooklyn Technical High School, and Pratt Institute, where he received his architectural degree in 1950.

During World War II he spent two years as a radioman on a submarine. In the postwar era he was a member of the 7th Regiment, New York State Guard, where in 1947 he received a trophy as the "outstanding athlete."

Active in professional and community affairs, he is a member of the American Institute of Architects, the New York Society of Architects, the New York State Association of Architects, a past president of the St. Bartholomew Holy Name Society and a member of the St. Andrew Avelino Holy Name Society.

Galvin is active with the Republican Party as a vice-president of the North Shore Republican Club, a member of the 6th A.D. and the Jackson Heights Republican Clubs, Heights Young Republican Club.

He was campaign coordinator last fall for Michael Stern, GOP candidate for City Council, and in the 1960 election was campaign coordinator for Joseph Modugno, Republican candidate for the State Senate.

Married to the former Margaret Rowland, he has two children, Susan, 12, and Stephen, 9. The Galvins reside at 32-18 168th street, Flushing.

He is a member of the firm of Lyras, Galvin and Anaya, 111 East 38th street, Manhattan.

Emil Levin, Independent

Emil Levin, Flushing attorney, is a busy man.

The 56-year-old independent candidate for Congress is a member of more than 40 organizations. He lists as one of his major projects the Child Service League's Turkey Mountain Camp in Westchester.

Born in Manhattan, Levin lived in Astoria as a child. He attended P.S. 5, Astoria; De Witt Clinton High School, where he was president of the G.O.

and the New York High School Student Association.

A graduate of Columbia College and New York University Law School, he was admitted to the bar in 1929. His law office is in Manhattan.

Levin ran for the Democratic nomination for Congress in the 1954 party primary. He was defeated by the incumbent, Lester Holtzman, whose election to the Supreme Court last fall has resulted in the present special election.

Levin has received a number of awards and citations, including the 1955 Queens County Jewish War Veterans' Interfaith Award; the 1954 citation given by the Queens-Long Island Division for the National Conference of Christians and Jews, for bettering human relations; the Flushing B'nai B'rith Americanism citation, and the Child Service League's annual award.

He and his wife, the former Vivian Epstein, live at 33-26 162nd street. They have two children, Victor Levin and Mrs. Susan Russakow, both of Forest Hills, and four grandchildren.

Seymour Thaler, Independent

State Senator Seymour R. Thaler of Forest Hills is running for Congress as an independent candidate.

He was elected to the State Senate in 1958 and reelected in 1960. He has served on the Senate Committees on education, Public Relief and Welfare, Penal Institutions and Internal Affairs. He has been a proponent of increased state aid for New York City.

Thaler was born in 1919 and graduated from Brooklyn Law School, cum laude, at 23. A year later he was appointed a deputy assistant attorney general.

In 1948 he was named law assistant to the Temporary City Housing Rent Commission, and in 1954 appointed deputy commissioner of investigation. He took a temporary leave of absence in 1955-56 to serve as special assistant to governor Harriman's counsel for the 30-day "bill period," to examine passed legislation and recommend for approval or veto.

Chop Chop OK Seen for Meat Law

A bill forbidding the sale of hamburgers containing an excessive amount of fat has been passed unanimously by the City Council and needs only the formality of a public hearing set for next Friday before it is signed into law.

The measure makes it a misdemeanor to sell hamburger not made of chopped fresh beef, sell chopped meat containing more than 30 per cent fat or sell packaged chopped meat minus a label specifying the kind of meat it contains.

Mayor Wagner lauded the Council for "prompt, effective action" on the bill and declared that the proposed local law was "essential to consumers."

ALBERT S. Pacetta, of Holmswood, commissioner of markets informed the council's Committee on City Affairs that the regulation was designed to restrain butchers from mixing another meat with the beef.

Meat grinders should be detained in the refrigerators of butcher shops, according to Joseph Cohen, representing the Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workers of North America. The union aide contended that grinders in the public part of a shop could be a health hazard because they could get contaminated easily.

After the public hearing scheduled for Friday, the Mayor is expected to sign the hamburger bill.

'Wouldn't Accept My Religion' Student Quits Frat, Puts Blame on 'Bias'

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP)—A Flushing student at the University of Kentucky said today he handed in his fraternity pledge pin after he said a delegation told him "two or three members of the fraternity wouldn't accept my religion."

The student, who is Jewish, is Jerry Berzofsky, 18, of 137-36 70th road, Flushing, N. Y., a sophomore. He said he has decided to leave the university this summer because of the incident involving Phi Gamma Delta fraternity.

"It's just prejudice and you can't change prejudice," he told the student newspaper. "It's a good fraternity."

RON WAGONER, chapter president, said several members were silent when Berzofsky's religion first was discussed. The rest of the members decided that since he was "not active religiously," he would be accepted as a member, but Wagoner added "the members just changed their minds... we wanted a closely knit group."

Wagoner said many eastern chapters of the fraternity have almost all Jewish members. Dean of Men Leslie Martin said Berzofsky's statements would be investigated.

Bus Route Extended

The Q-28 Flushing-Bayside West bus route will be extended for a six-month trial beginning Sunday, according to Hyman Feldman, general superintendent of the bus division of the Transit Authority.

Feldman said the line will be extended from Corporal Kennedy street and 32nd avenue to Corporal Kennedy street and 18th avenue.
