Dealers Say They'll Stay Shut Until Black Market Ends

Every butcher shop in Queens may be closed within a week in an effort to "break the back of the black market," it was indicated today as the Greater New York Meat Dealers Protective Association announced plans to picket every meat market which remains

The association was organized yesterday by 1,000 retail dealers who locked their shops and vowed they would not reopen until the black market was smashed.

The organization estimated that it has 250 members in Queens who closed their shops today. Unaffiliated dealers, including

several in North Queens, have joined in an apparently spontaneous uprising by butchers throughout the city to crush the black market.

North Queens police today were ordered to check on all butcher shops in their precincts to determine the number that were closed. The names of owners and the types headquarters today.

### 30 Factories, Stores Join On-the-Job Program To Put More Than 500 Veterans to Work

It was just four months ago that Uncle Sam first offered Queens veterans a financial lift while training for a life job.

And already veterans are working under the terms of this program — receiving supplemental subsistence of from \$65 to \$90 a month — in 130 plants, offices and stores in the borough. And the number of participating employers is growing so fast that the number may be doubled within another month.

The salient feature of the On-the-Job Training Program, a provision of the amended Servicemen's Readjustment Act or "G.I. Bill of Rights," is the simplicity with which employers can cooperate.

The program, in effect, provides a subsidy to the veteran by the payment of \$15-a-week supplemental subsistence to single veterans and \$20 a week to married veterans. In exchange, the employer is asked to provide training which will qualify the veteran eventually to earn the wage of a fully-trained worker. But this does not mean that an employer must hire

experienced vocational teachers to carry out his part of the bargain. The fact that he is operating a businessregardless of its size—is accepted by the State Division of Veterans Affairs, which administers the On-the-Job Training Program in New York, as evidence of his ability to train others. The employer's first step to qualify for using vet-

eran trainees in his business is to make a written application to the Division of Veterans Affairs at its offices at 111 Broadway, Manhattan, or at 28-53 Steinway street, An inspection of the business establishment will fol-
