

Bus From Far Rockaway To Manhattan Scheduled

Express bus service from Far Rockaway to Manhattan will start on Monday, December 20.

According to Green Bus Lines, the Manhattan-bound bus will leave from Mott avenue and Beach 21st street at 6:45 a.m. Monday through Friday, except for holidays. For the return trip, the bus will leave 34th street and Third avenue at 5:18 p.m.

Exact fare will be required—\$1.50 one way.

From Mott avenue and Beach 21st street, the bus will travel along Beach 20th street to Seagirt boulevard, on Seagirt boulevard to Beach Channel drive to Beach 73rd street to Rockaway Beach boulevard to Cross Bay boulevard and on Cross Bay boulevard to Woodhaven boulevard and the Long Island expressway, Midtown Tunnel, 34th street, Avenue of the Americas, 57th street and back.

Stops in Rockaway will be at Mott avenue and Beach 21st

street, Beach 20th street and Cornaga avenue, Beach 20th street and Brookhaven avenue, Beach 20th street and Seagirt boulevard, Seagirt boulevard and Beach 27th street, Beach Channel drive and Beach 63rd street, Beach Channel drive

Sunday parking regulations will be in effect on Thanksgiving Day, Thursday, November 25.

According to Traffic Commissioner Theodore Karagheuzoff, parking will be permitted wherever signs indicate that parking is legal on Sunday. Alternate side-of-the-street Sanitation regulations will be suspended. Parking meter rules will apply only at meters which normally operate on Sunday. Exclusive bus lanes which do not operate on Sunday will not be in effect.

Regulations which prohibit parking, standing or stopping will remain in effect.

Nursing Homes

See Threat In Medicaid Rates

Publication of revised Medicaid rates for nursing homes and health-related facilities poses a serious problem for the health facilities on the Rockaway Peninsula, as well as throughout the state, according to the Association of Health Care Facilities of the Rockaways.

The nursing homes and health-related facilities on the peninsula represent 3,000 patients and residents and more than 4,000 employees, primarily coming from the surrounding community, it is noted. The Association of Health Care Facilities of the Rockaways consists of 18 member homes, in-

cluding proprietary and non-proprietary facilities which are dedicated to giving the ultimate in nursing and personal care. (Standards of care have always been high but this recent action of the Department of Health will cause an unbearable economic burden affecting the operation of the homes. It will be impossible to maintain present levels of care and yet the suggestion for the home to produce less than maximum care and service is unthinkable.)

This is an unprecedented health care crisis for the patients involved as well as the strain on supportive services offered by the local hospitals. The immediate attention of the public is imperative if a crisis is to be avoided. The skilled nursing facilities and the health related facilities stand ready to open discussions with all interested parties.

Current GI Bill Use Double Expense

Unprecedented use of the current GI Bill by veterans and servicemen has resulted in higher dollar costs during its first 10 years than the combined total of the two previous GI Bills, the Veterans Administration has revealed.

More than \$20 billion has been paid to 6.6 million trainees since the current bill was enacted in 1966. Benefits will continue through 1989, but the period for earning new eligibility will be closed out December 31, 1976, by recent legislation.

Total cost of the World War II GI Bill, which ended in 1956, was \$14.5 billion. The Korean Conflict bill cost \$4.5 billion during its 12½-year existence.
