WTA FINALS – FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 8 – SEMIFINALS

[7] Zheng Qinwen (CHN) vs [8] Barbora Krejckikova (CZE)

Zheng leads 1-0; only previous meeting came at 2023 Zhengzhou final 2-6, 6-2, 6-4

After losing the opening match to Sabalenka, Zheng defeated Rybakina and Paolini; in those matches Zheng produced nine service breaks while suffering only three

This year's WTA leader in aces, Zheng hit 12 aces in her win over Paolini along with 0 double faults; through the round robin stage she has served 26 aces with only nine double faults

An Olympic gold medalist, Zheng is the youngest player to make the semifinals at the WTA Finals in her first appearance since Petra Kvitova in 2011

Zheng is projected to move to No.6 in the final WTA Rankings of 2024 by reaching the SF this week and can improve her ranking to either No.5 (R-Up) or No.3 or No.4 with the title

Krejckikova qualified for the WTA Finals as a Grand Slam champion, finishing in Top 20 of the Race

In her opening match, Krejckikova was up a set and two breaks vs Swiatek, before Swiatek staged a comeback. Krejckikova then defeated Jessica Pegula and Coco Gauff to advance to the semifinals

Krejckikova became the first player ranked outside the WTA Top 10 to win two matches at the Finals since Elena Dementieva in 2000

Krejckikova entered the WTA Finals ranked No.13; she will move into the Top 10 in the final 2024 rankings climbing to No.10 with SF, No.9 as runner-up or No.8 with title

[1] Aryna Sabalenka vs [3] Coco Gauff (USA)

*Series tied 4-4; this will be third meeting of 2024 with Sabalenka winning both – Wuhan (SF) and Australian Open (SF)...
A rematch of the 2023 US Open final won by Gauff in 3-sets*

Since the summer – after not playing Wimbledon nor the Olympics – Sabalenka has won three titles – Cincinnati, US Open and Wuhan

Sabalenka has already secured the 2024 year-end No.1 ranking

Sabalenka is the first player to reach back-to-back semifinals at the WTA Finals as World No.1 since Serena Williams in 2013-2014

Sabalenka has won eight of her last nine matches against Top 10 players

Sabalenka is bidding for her 9th win at the WTA Finals – only Caroline Wozniacki (13) and Iga Swiatek (11) would have more at the event among active players

Sabalenka is the first player to reach the semi-finals at the WTA Finals for three consecutive seasons since Karolina Pliskova (2017-2019).

Aryna Sabalenka (40) has registered the most WTA match wins on hard court of any player so far in 2024, with Coco Gauff (33) claiming the next-most on the surface.

Sabalenka could become the first World No.1 to reach the final at the WTA Finals since Ashleigh Barty in 2019

Along with Iga Swiatek, Sabalenka holds the most wins over WTA top 10 opponents in 2024, with both on 11 such wins so far this year.

Gauff has won a career-high 52 matches this year, including Olympics and team events

At 20 years, 240 days old, Gauff is the youngest American to reach back-to-back semi-finals at the WTA Finals since Tracy Austin (1979-80)

Since the reintroduction of the round robin format in 2003, Gauff is only the third player to reach back-to-back semifinals at the WTA Finals before turning 21, along with Maria Sharapova (2004-06) and Caroline Wozniacki (2009-10)

Gauff would be the youngest player to reach the final at the WTA Finals since Caroline Wozniacki in 2010

At 20 years and 240 days, Coco Gauff could become the youngest player to defeat the World No.1 at the WTA Finals since Maria Sharapova, who defeated Lindsay Davenport in 2004 (RR2).

Gauff could become the third player in as many years to defeat the World No.1 to reach the final at the WTA Finals, along with Iga Swiatek (2023) and her next opponent, Aryna Sabalenka (2022).

Melichar-Martinez/Perez (2-1):

- Team is making its second-consecutive appearance at the WTA Finals after finishing as runners-up last year
- Have been regular partners since April 2022
- Teamed up to win two WTA 500 titles this year (San Diego and Bad Homburg) and also reached finals at Linz and WTA 1000 Dubai
- This is the fourth time Melichar-Martinez will contest matches at the WTA Finals; along with her final last year, she played in 2018 (w/Peschke, lost opening match) and 2021 (made SF w/Schuurs)
- This is their second WTA Finals appearance as a team
- Perez hit a career-high ranking of No.7 earlier this year, and she has won 7 career WTA doubles titles

Dabrowski/Routliffe (3-0):

- The duo has teamed up for 25 events as part of their partnership, reaching the final 8 times, including 3 titles; in 2024 played 16 tournaments reaching five finals (1-4 in finals); won only title at Nottingham
- This is the second consecutive year they have qualified for the WTA Finals as a team; last year at the WTA Finals in Cancun they reached the semifinals after going 3-0 in round robin stage
- Together they reached the QF at each of the Slams they contested this year – Australian Open (SF), Wimbledon (R-Up) and US Open (QF); Dabrowski was sidelined during clay court season; Routliffe reached R16 at Roland Garros (w/Leylah Fernandez)
- Routliffe won 51 matches across all levels in 2024 – including an ITF W60 title at Burnie, Australia the week after the Australian Open
- Routliffe played 22 tournaments with six different partners this year
- Routliffe climbed to the top of the WTA Rankings in July and held the WTA World No.1 doubles ranking for 8 weeks
- Dabrowski is making her sixth WTA Finals appearance, tied for most among this year's doubles field

Siniakova/Townsend (3-0):

- Siniakova has won 16 matches in doubles competition at the WTA Finals, the most among active players
- Most wins at WTA Finals in doubles: Martina Navratilova (28), Pam Shriver (26), Natasha Zvereva (17), Jana Novotna (17), Arantxa Sanchez-Vicario (16) and Siniakova (16)
- Siniakova has secured the year-end No.1 doubles ranking; this will be her fourth year finishing as the year-end doubles No.1
- Siniakova captured five doubles titles this year, including two Grand Slams - all with different partners
- As a team, Siniakova/Townsend captured the Wimbledon title
- Siniakova enters the WTA Finals as WTA World No.1 in doubles, a distinction she has held for 123 total weeks (as of October 28), good for sixth most in Tour history trailing only Natasha Zvereva (124), Lisa Raymond (137), Cara Black (163), Liezel Huber (199) and Martina Navratilova (237)
- Townsend won a total of three doubles titles in 2024, each with a different partner: Washington DC (w/Muhammad), Wimbledon (w/Siniakova), Adelaide (w/Haddad Maia)
- Townsend is making her WTA Finals debut, while Siniakova is making her 6th consecutive WTA Finals appearance; she previously teamed up with Barbora Krejckova to compete at the WTA Finals five times: 2018 (R-Up), 2019 (RR), 2021 (Won), 2022 (R-Up) and 2023 (RR)
- Among this year's doubles field, Siniakova is tied with Gabriela Dabrowski and Elise Mertens for most WTA Finals appearances

Chan/Kudermetova (2-1):

- Formed their partnership in April; won their second tournament as a team taking the title at Stuttgart; in 12 tournaments reached four finals
- The duo made back-to-back WTA 500 finals during the grass court swing at Berlin and Bad Homburg and also had strong results reaching semifinals at US Open and first WTA 1000 final at Beijing
- Chan is returning to the WTA Finals for the first time since 2019. All three of her previous appearances came alongside older sister Latisha
- Kudermetova has won 7 of 8 doubles matches at the WTA Finals to date: she won the title with a perfect 5-0 record alongside Elise Mertens in her only previous appearance in 2022

- Lost to Aryna Sabalenka in opening match, but defeated Elena Rybakina and Jasmine Paolini to finish 2nd place in the Purple Group (2-1 record) and advance to the semifinals
- Faces No.13 Barbora Krejckikova in SF today; owns 21 wins in career over Top 20 players including her two victories this week
- Owns 5-6 career tour-level record against players from the Czech Republic (4-2 in 2024)
- Record in WTA SF matches stands at 8-3 (5-1 this year)
- 2 of her 5 career WTA singles titles have come on hard court (2023 Zhengzhou and 2024 Tokyo)
- Best result by a Chinese player at the WTA Finals was Li Na's runner-up finish in 2013 (l. Serena Williams)
- This week, Zheng became the second player from China to reach the semifinals of the WTA Finals after Li Na in 2013
- Is currently ranked a career-high No.7; this time last year was ranked No.15
- Has posted a 30-5 win-loss record since Wimbledon, which is the most WTA-level match-wins of any player during that time span
- This season's tour leader in total aces (432) and percentage of first-serve points won (76.1%)

- Making 2nd singles appearance at the WTA Finals; she went 0-3 in the 2021 group stages
- Lost to Iga Swiatek in her opening match this week, but defeated Jessica Pegula and Coco Gauff to win the Orange Group (2-1 record) and advance to the semifinals
- Secured a year-end Top 10 finish with her win over Gauff on Friday
- Faces No.7 Zheng Qinwen in SF today; owns 15 wins in career over Top 10 players including her two wins this week
- Owns 10-3 career tour-level record against players from China (2-0 in 2024)
- Record in WTA SF matches stands at 13-1; her only tour-level loss in a SF was to Sabalenka at 2020 Linz (Sabalenka was ranked No.11 and Krejckikova was ranked No.74 at the time)
- 5 of her 8 career WTA singles titles have come on hard court, most recently 2023 San Diego
- The most recent Czech singles champion at the WTA Finals is Petra Kvitova in 2011
- Is currently ranked No.13; this time last year was ranked No.10. Peaked at a career-high ranking of No.2 in 2022
- By beating Gauff, became the lowest-ranked player to claim a Top 5 win at the WTA Finals since No.14 Sandrine Testud defeated Jennifer Capriati in 2001 QF
- This week, claimed multiple Top 10 wins at a single event for only the third time in her career, along with 2023 Dubai and 2024 Wimbledon (on both of those previous occasions, she won the title)

CAREER MILESTONES

- Earned 2023 WTA Most Improved Player of year ending the season at No.15 and inside the Top 20 for the first time
- Won maiden WTA titles in 2023 at Palermo (d. Paolini in F) and Zhengzhou (d. Krejckova in F); also reached final at WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai (l. Haddad Maia), SF at Abu Dhabi and first career Grand Slam QF at US Open (l. Sabalenka)
- Broke into Top 20 for the first time on May 22, 2023
- Won WTA Newcomer of the Year in 2022; reached first WTA final at Tokyo (l. Samsonova) and also made SF at Melbourne Summer Set 1, as qualifier, QF at Toronto and R16 at Roland Garros
- Broke into Top 50 at No.46 after run to fourth round in Paris that year
- Scored first Top 20 win over No.19 Simona Halep at 2022 Roland Garros then earned two Top 10 wins over No.5 Ons Jabeur at Toronto and No.4 Paula Badosa at Tokyo
- Broke into Top 100 on January 31, 2022, following run through qualifying to 2r at Australian Open
- Also won title at WTA 125K event in Valencia in June 2022
- Ended 2021 at No.143, her first Top 150 finish
- Reached 2r on WTA main draw debut in 2021 at Palermo (as qualifier, l. Cristian)
- Made further main draw appearances in 2021 at Moscow (as qualifier, l. Tsurenko in 1r) and Courmayeur (as qualifier, l. Vekic in 1r); also contested qualifying in Strasbourg
- Made WTA debut in 2019, appearing in qualifying at Miami, Tianjin and Wuhan
- Made ITF debut in 2018; gone on to amass nine ITF singles titles with 9-0 record in finals
