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2 Happy Valley Lotus Garden



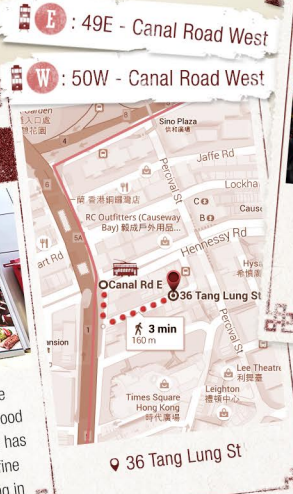

3 Causeway Bay Tang Lung Street



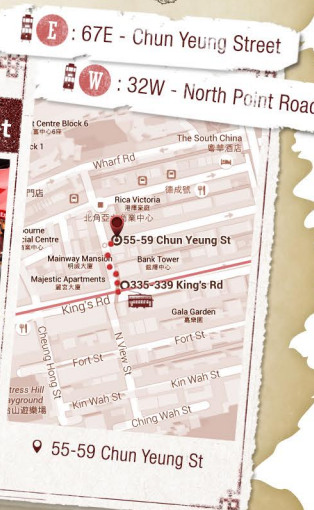
