To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,
The humble Address of the Noblemen, Gentlemen, Clergy, and Freeholders of the County of Middlesex.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE beg Leave to join in the general Voice of the People, and to declare our hearty and zealous Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Family, and to our happy Constitution, Civil and Religious, as established in this Kingdom. Permit us to return your Majesty our unfeigned Thanks for your late gracious Proclamation, warning us against the mischievous Designs of ill-disposed Persons, who are endeavouring by wicked and seditious Writings, indoltriously dispersed through the Kingdom, to raise Jealousies and Discontents among the People, and inflame their Minds with Representations of imaginary Grievances at a Time when the Country, under the Blessing of Providence, is enjoying an unexampled State of Prosperity and Happiness.

We beg Leave to assure your Majesty, that our Endeavours shall not be wanting, by every legal and constitutional Means, to discourage and prevent all Proceedings tending to produce Riots, Tumults, and Disorders, which are inconsistent with the Preservation of Public Liberty, and destructive of those invaluable Rights and Privileges we enjoy, and which can only be effectually secured to us by a due Obedience to the Laws, by a steady Adherence to and firm Support of those wise and wholesome Provisions

made at the Time of the Glorious Revolution, and further strengthened and confirmed to us by subsequent Acts of the Legislature. Convinced of the Excellence of our Constitution, we feel ourselves in a particular Manner bound to guard against all Attempts to disturb the Public Peace and Tranquillity of the Kingdom, which must, in the most forcible Manner, affect and injure this populous and commercial County, weaken the Credit and Importance of the Country with Foreign Nations, and lessen the Security and Happiness of the People. With these Sentiments we most heartily join in wishing your Majesty long to reign over a free and loyal People.

proud Pre-eminence of your Majesty's English Subjects, we trust that we should at no Time want Motives to fulfil conscientiously the important Duties given us in Charge; but in this our more than ordinary Attention has been directed to those Objects which the wise Vigilance of your late Proclamation has pointed to our present and peculiar Care.

With the ingenious Pleasure of unquestionable Truth, we presume to assure your Majesty of our conscientious Belief, that no seditious Publications have been industriously dispersed within the Extent of our Powers of Enquiry; that therein we know of no factious Assemblies; no Appearance of private Discontents; no Indication of Public Alarm. From ourselves, at such a Period, the Offer of our Lives and Fortunes, always due to the King whom we piously revere, to the Country which we dearly love, were superfluous. These Offers and these Services are fitted to Times of Danger and Distress. But this is a Time of true Glory to your Majesty, to us your faithful and loving Subjects, of the full Enjoyment of all the Fruits of Peace. Nor is there ought known of reasonable Fear but what Nature has blended with and made inseparable from extreme Affection. But may it please All-gracious Providence long to permit your paternal Government to an happy undivided People. And when in the Dispensations of its supreme Wisdom it shall remove you to an higher Throne, may loyal Subjects continue under the Protection of Princes who, descended from your Loins, shall be emulous of all your Virtues, faithfully upholding the venerable Fabric of our Constitution, too perfect for modern Sciolists in Polity intemperately to alter, or fancifully to improve; and of that Compactness and Solidity which shall shall never be impaired by the wild Attempts of desperate Adventurers, who, were they able, would lay prostrate legal Liberty, and tear up the Foundations of Civil Security and social Happiness. So shall it be justified to the World, and to the sober Spirit of Legislation, that Englishmen know better than any other People upon Earth how to value at the same Time these Three great Advantages, Religion, Commerce, and Liberty.

This Morning, soon after Five o'Clock, Their Majesties and Their Royal Highnesses the Princesses, set out for Weymouth.

St. James's, August 15.

Ceremonial of the Knighthood and Investiture of the Right Honorable Lieutenant-General Sir William Augustus Pitt, one of His Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council in Ireland, and the Honorable Lieutenant-General Sir John Vaughan, Knights of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath.

THE Knights and the Officers of the Order attended in the Privy Chamber, in their Mantles, Collars, &c. and proceeded from thence, after the Levee, into the Sovereign's Presence, making the usual Reverences, in the following Order:

Gentleman Usher of the Order, in his Mantle, Chain and Badge, bearing the Scarlet Rod.

Deputy to Bath King of Arms, in the Mantle, Chain and Badge of Bath, bearing the Ribbons and Badges of the Order on a Crimson Velvet Cushion.

Then, by the Sovereign's Command, the Right Honorable William Augustus Pitt was introduced into the Presence between Sir William Fawcett and Sir William Howe, the Two Junior Knights present, preceded by the Gentleman Usher of the Order, with Reverences as before.

The Sword of State was delivered to the Sovereign by Sir Ralph Payne, the Second Knight in Seniority, and the Right Honorable William Augustus Pitt kneeling, was knighted therewith. Then His Royal Highness the Duke of York, the Senior Knight, presented the Ribbon and Badge to the Sovereign, and His Majesty put them over the new Knight's Right Shoulder, who being thus invested had the Honor to kiss His Majesty's Hand.

In like Manner the Honorable John Vaughan was afterwards introduced into the Presence, knighted, and invested with the Ribbon and Badge of the Order; and having likewise kissed His Majesty's Hand, the Procession returned to the Privy Chamber, in the Order above mentioned.

The Ceremony was performed in His Majesty's Closet, several Great Officers of the Court being present.

St. James's, August 15.

This Day M. le Comte de Starhemberg, sent from the Emperor to notify His Imperial Majesty's Election to be King of the Romans, and his subsequent Coronation as Emperor of Germany, had a private Audience of Leave of His Majesty; to which he was introduced by the Right Honorable Henry Dundas, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, (in the Absence of the Right Honorable Lord Grenville, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs) and conducted by Stephen Cottrell, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.

The King has been pleased to grant to the Right Honorable Charles Earl Cornwallis, Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, and the Heirs Male of his Body lawfully begotten, the Dignity of a Marquis of the Kingdom of Great Britain, by the Name, Style and Title of Marquis Cornwallis.

The King has been pleased to confer the Honor of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath on Major-General William Medows and Major-General Robert Abercromby.

The King has been pleased to grant to the Right Honorable William Pitt the Office of Contable of His Majesty's Castle of Dover, and also the Office of Warden and Keeper of His Majesty's Cinque Ports; and the Office of Admiralty within the said Cinque Ports, and their Members; and likewise all Wrecks of the Sea whatsoever.

The King has been pleased to grant to the Reverend Charles Miller, of Acomb in the County of the City of York, and his Issue, His Royal Licence and Authority to assume and take the Surname and bear the Arms of Percival; such Arms being first duly exemplified according to the Laws of Arms, and recorded in the Heralds Office: And also to order that this His Majesty's Concession and Declaration be registered in His College of Arms.
