The humble Address of the Bayliff, Recorder, Capital and Inferior Burgeses, and also the Grand-Fury of Your Majesties Ancient Borough of Bergevenny, at the General Sessions of the Peace held for the said Borough the Eighth day of October, Anno Regni Regis Caroli secundi nunc Angliæ, &c. xxxv. Annoq; Dom. 1683.

Dread Sovereign,

WE Your Majesties most Loyal and Dutiful Subjects, seriously reflecting on the exceeding great Felicity, which we and all Your Majesties People have enjoyed (ever since Your Majesties most happy Restauration) by Your Majesties most gracious Reign over us; cannot hear, without Amazement and Abhorreny, that a Traiterous and bloody Conspiracy hath been plotted and contrived against the Life of Your Sacred Majesty, and the Life of your Dearest Brother, James, Duke of York; We cannot without Astonishment but admire, and with hearts and hands lifted up, must praise the goodness of Heaven, for the timely and happy discovery of so Impious and horrid a Machination; which (had it succeeded) must of necessity have involved the whole Nation in Confusion, Blood, and Ruine. We shall therefore humbly make incessant Prayers to the great God of Heaven, the Protector of Kings, that He will be pleased, of his Infinite Wisdom, to continue His Mercies to us, by being always propitious to Your Majesty in all Your undertakings; And we humbly beseech Your Majesty to give us leave to add this further Assurance, That we are all unanimously resolved to stand by and defend Your Sacred Majesty, Your Heirs and Lawful Successors, to the last extremity of our Lives and Fortunes, and all that is dearest unto us, against all Fanatical Rebels, Traitors and Conspirators whatsoever. The which we shall at all times, and upon all occasions, be in the greatest readines to perform, as holding it our bounden Duty in all Emergencies, and upon all Opportunities, to shew our selves.

To the King's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Young men of the Town of Kingston upon Hull, the Third day of September, 1683.

Great Sir,

OUR obscure and private Condition makes us Strangers to the Majesty of Kings, and the Sacredness of their Persons, possesseth us with an awful Fear, to offend their Greatness; But like the dumb Son of Cræsus, when our Sovereign hath been in danger of Assassination, we must cry out against the Horridness of the Attempt, and return our Thanks to Almighty God for delivering Your Sacred Majesty and Royal Brother, from the wicked Conspiracy told us in Your gracious Declaration, the Horror whereof fills our minds with Detestation of all Fanatical and Diabolical Plots of Inhumane Villains, void of Piety and Morality, whose Treasons are direct Affronts to the Omnipotent, who is the Guardian of His Vicegerent.

We blush to read the Records which attest Your God-like Father's being by Usurped Power deny'd Entrance into this his own Town, which fatal action drew the greatest trains of Miseries after it: We, though then unborn, lament the wickedness thereof; and present our just Abhorrence of all Designs against Your Majesties Person and Government: And now offer the first Fruits of our Lives, with all our powers to defend Your Majesty and Government against all Associating Abolomans and Achitophels; humbly presuming to add this Petition to our Litany; From restless Pettish Whig-Zealots, Idolaters of a Commonwealt, endeavouring to ruffe

us into the Savage Rebellious State of Forty One, Good Lord deliver us! And

That it would please Him to preserve Your Sacred Majesty in the highest Glory of Your Ancestors, That Your Crown may flourish long on Your Royal Head: That this Monarchy may be immortal, The Lineal Descent unalterable: That we may always have Industrious Princes of Your Majesties Royal Family to Iwa, the Scepter of this Realm, is the daily Prayer of Your Majesties most Loyal and most dutiful Subjects.

There have been likewise presented to His Majesty, very Loyal Addressees from the following Counties and Corporations in Ireland, which His Majesty received with His wonted Grace and Goodness.

From the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons, and Citizens of the Antient and Loyal City of Dublin.

From the Mayor, Aldermen, Sheriffs, and Common-Council of the Antient Town and County of Drogheda.

From the Sovereign, Recorder, Burgeses, and Commons of Kinfales.

From the Governor, High Sheriff, Justices of the Peace, Grand-Jury and Gentry of the County of Galloway, at the Assizes held for the said County, Sept. 3. 1683.

From the Justices of the Peace, Commissioners of Array, Officers of the Militia, Gentlemen and Freeholders of the County of Cavan.

From the Justices of the Peace and the Grand-Jury, for the City and County of London Derry. Sept. 18. 1683.

Rome, Octob. 6. The Pope upon the first news he had of the raising the Siege of Vienna, sent 100000 Crowns to the Emperor; and has since ordered a like sum to be sent to the King of Poland; and has declared, That he will contribute for his part 40000 Crowns a month towards the carrying on the War against the Turks. And the Cardinals and many other persons Quality, do likewise give considerable sums, which are paid into the Apostolick Chamber; so that according to all appearance a great Fond will be established for this service. The Sicur *Talenti*, who brought hither the great Standard of *Mabomet*, which the King of Poland took at the Battle of Vienna, and sent as a Present to the Pope, took his leave two days ago in order to his return for Hungary.

Genova, Octob. 20. The Spanish Gallies remain still at *Porta Spetia*, expecting there the arrival of the Armada, which it's said, are driven by bad weather to *Palermo*. Our Letters from *Milan* of the 13th instant, told us, that the Troops in that Dutchy were marching to the Camp which the Count *de Melgar* has caused to be marked out for them on the *Po*; and that His Excellency has likewise given orders for the preparing a Train of Artillery.

Marseilles, Octob. 29. The news of this place is, that Monsieur *du Quesne* is retired from before *Argiers*, having left some of his lightest Ships to Cruise on that Coast; that these are to be very suddenly relieved by Monsieur *de Lery*, who will have a Squadron of 7 or 8 Men of War which is now sitting out at *Tboulon*; that Monsieur *du Quesne* is gone for *Malta*, and that from thence he is to stand over for *Tripoly*.

Warsaw, October 8. The Troops of *Lithuania* are on their march for Hungary, to joya the King of Poland; and we are told that above 1000 Gentle-

men

men of that Dutchy have resolv'd to follow with four Men each, two on Horseback and two on foot. We have advice that the Turks of *Caminiec*, having joyn'd a Party of Tartars, had surpriz'd near *Bracklau* 1000 Cossacks who were going for *Hungary*, and had killed many of them, after which the Turks and the Tartars fell into the *Ukraine*, and plundered and burnt several Villages.

Stockholm, Octob. 16. The 9th instant the King of Sweden arriv'd here from *Gottenburg*, where, a day or two before his departure, arriv'd an Officer which Lieutenant-Admiral *Bastiaenz*, who Commands the Dutch Fleet now at Sea, sent to His Majesty. The 14th the King gave Audience to the *Moscovite* Ambassadors. We are told that Count *Alheim*, the Imperial Envoy, is in few days to have his Audience of leave.

Cologne, Octob. 23. The Deputies of the Elector of *Trier*, and the Duke of *Newbourg*, are expected here in few days; They come in pursuance of the Commission their Masters have from the Emperor, to endeavour joyntly with the *Sieur Fodoci*, the Imperial Minister here, to re-establish the affairs of this City upon the antient foundation, and to put an end to the disorders that have of late troubled the publick peace. In the mean time the Deputies of this City are parted from hence for *Vienna*, to give the Emperor an account of their proceedings, and to justify them. According to our last advices from *Hungary*, the King of *Poland* and the Duke of *Lorrain*, had resolv'd to besiege *Gran*; The Cavalry of the Circle of *Franconia* was coming back to winter in the Empire.

Liege, Octob. 26. The Endeavours that have been used for the accommodating the differences which have so long depended between this City and the Elector of *Cologne*, their Prince, are like to have at last a good success; The 32 Companies or Trades having by plurality of Voices approved of the Project of Accommodation, which the Bishop of *Strasbourg* delivered to their Deputies at *Stavelo*, and the said Bishop is expected here this day to conclude this affair.

Brussels, November 5. On Tuesday last we had the news here that the French Army under the Command of the *Marschal d'Humieres* had Besieged *Courtray*; and this day we hear that the Town is Surrendred; the Governor, and Garison which consisted in two Regiments of Horse and two of Foot, being retired into the Cittadel. Our Letters from *Litz* and *Vienna*, give us an account that the Troops of *Lithuania*, and the Cossacks which were coming to joyn the King of *Poland* in *Hungary*, had fallen upon Count *Teckley* near *Arva*, that they had defeated him, had killed 2000 of his men, and taken four pieces of Cannon and most of his Baggage, and that he and the rest of his Troops were fled into the Mountain-Towns; and that the Duke of *Lorrain* had besieged *Gran* with the Imperial Army, having begun the Siege the 20 of the last Month; and that the King of *Poland* was march'd with his Forces towards *Buda*, with a design, as was believed, to attack *Pest*, which lies over against *Buda*, and covers the Bridge of that place.

Dunkirk, November 6. There are Letters from the French Army dated the 4th of this month, which tell us; That the *Marschal d'Humieres* decamp'd from *Lessines* on Sunday last, and the next day being the first instant, set down before *Courtray*. They open'd not their Trenches till the third at night, but then advanced them with so much diligence that they lodg'd themselves that night on the Counterscarp, with the loss of about 109 men killed and wounded; and the next morning, the day these Letters were written, the Town surrendred, the Burghers having oblig'd the Governor and

the Garison, which it's said consisted of about 1100 Men, to retire into the Cittadel, against which the Besiegers intended to break ground the day following.

Whitehall, Novemb. 2. His Majesty was pleas'd to Command the Honourable Mr. *Boyle*, to attend Him to give His Majesty an Ocular Proof of the Nicety of his way of examining the Freshness and Saltness of Water, and to apply it to the Sea Water, prepar'd according to the Patentees Invention; which being done before His Majesty, his Royal Highness, and the Duke of *Graston*, several Persons of Quality being also present, it was made apparent by a certain prepar'd Liquid which Mr. *Boyle* had brought with him, that a Discovery could be made if there were so much as a thousandth part of Salt in a propos'd Water; by which Trial His Majesty finding that the Prepar'd Sea Water, for which He has granted His Royal Patent, was at least as free from Salt as the best Waters used in this Town; received such satisfaction as to the wholsomeness of the said Water, that He was pleas'd to declare His Royal Intentions both to encourage the said Invention, and to have the said Water made use of in His several Maritime Garisons, which Nature has not furnish'd with wholsome Water.
