

Passenger; but the Force of this Ship, her Name, being called the *Heldenburg*, the time of her coming from *Amsterdam*, and other Circumstances agreeing with the account we had from *England* of the Ship that brought the late Duke of *Monmouth* to *Lime*, giving occasion to suspect that this was the Vessel, or at least that she was going to Pyrate in the *Indies*, some of the English Merchants informed the Governor thereof, who thereupon went with his Officers to their Lodging; and finding upon their Examination great ground to encrease the suspicion, left two Guards at the Door of the House, and immediately sent to Arrest the Ship. The next Morning the Captain and the Scotch-man escaped, but the former was overtaken by a Messenger, as he was going over the Bar about two Leagues from hence, and brought back to Prison, the latter cannot yet be found, though diligent search is made for him: They left behind them two Portmantles, which the Governor caused to be opened, wherein were found several Rich Sutes of Apparel, and a Rich Furniture for a Horse. The English-man and Chirurgion were likewise seized.

Edinburgh, July 21. John Campbell Son to the late Earl of *Argyle*, and Campbell Son to the Lord *Neil Campbell*, who were in the late Rebellion, have rendered themselves, and are committed to Prison. *Charles Campbell* another of the said late Earls Sons, who was reported to be dead of a Fever, was lately taken, and is now also a Prisoner.

Whitehall, July 25. His Majesty has received an Account by Letters written the 15th of the last month off of *Mamora* on the Coast of *Sally*, That Captain *Leighton* in his Majesty's Ship the *Larke*, Captain *Mac Donnel* in the *Greyhound*, with the *Bonadventure*, commanded by Mr. *Fairban* her Lieutenant, Captain *Priestman* being sick ashore, arriving on the 12th past before *Mamora*, Captain *Leighton* stood close in with the Bar, and saw two Ships at Anchor within the Harbour, which he knew to be *Hackome* Admiral of *Sally*, and another Ship of War that had not been long there; Upon which, and the Information he received the next day from four Christians, and particularly from *Thomas Phelps*, who escaped from Shore, he resolved to attempt the burning of them, and communicated the same to Captain *Mac Donnel* and Mr. *Fairban*, who having approved thereof, They agreed to send in all their Boats under the command of Mr. *Mac Donnel* in the *Greyhounds* Boat, the *Larkes* Boat being commanded by Capt. *Leighton's* Brother; The *Bonadventures* Pinnace by Mr. *Harris*, accompanied by Mr. *Lisleton*, and the *Yauls* by Mr. *Brisbane*, both Midshipmen Extraordinary, all manned with chosen Men, well armed and fitted with sufficient quantity of Fireworks. At eight a clock at night they went from the Ships in good order and fell in with the Bar about 10; They found each side of the Channel well guarded, and the Ships too, which was more than was expected, but not sufficient to deter them, for they boldly rowed in and boarded the Ships, which they found manned with about 20 or 30 men apiece, and armed with great Guns and Pedereroes. After a fierce dispute on both sides, with Vollicies of small and great shot from the Town and Castles, which were not above half Pistol-shot off, by continual firing Small-shot and throwing in Hand-Grenadoes, they cleared the Ships Decks and entered them, setting them on fire in several places, killed several Moors, destroyed what other Vessels and Boats were then there, and carried off four Christians. *Hackomes* Ship was mounted with 36 Pieces of Cannon and about 25 Pedereroes; the other was *Plumash* his Ship of 26 or 28 Guns and as many Pedereroes, both robbed out in 15 or 20 days, and therefore had on board all their Ammunition and Habitaments of War, with all their Sails, together with the greatest part of the Furniture and Rigging for their new Ships building at *Sally*. These with several

others were consumed with Fire in less than two hours, and our Men and Boats safely on Board again. The loss on our side was inconsiderable in respect of the Service, having but one Man mortally wounded and five or six others slightly hurt; They all behaved themselves with the greatest courage and obedience to their Orders, especially in despoiling all manner of Plunder as they had been cautioned by Captain *Leighton* and Captain *Mac Donnell*.

Whitehall, July 23. Yesterday the Installation of the Three Knights of the Garter Elect, viz. *Henry Duke of Norfolk* Earl-Marshal of *England*, *Henry Earl of Peterborough* Groom of the Stole to his Majesty, and *Laurence Earl of Rochester* Lord High-Treasurer of *England*, was performed in the Royal Chapel of *St. George* within the Castle of *Windsor*, by the Dukes of *Ormond* and *Beaufort*, two Knights of the said Order, Commissioned thereunto by the Sovereign, with all the accustomed Ceremonies; After which the new Installed Knights Entertained the Commissioners and the other Noblemen and Persons of Quality there present, at a Splendid Feast in the Kings Great Guard-Chamber within the said Castle. A fuller Account whereof will be speedily published.

Whitehall, July 24. This day the Right Honorable the Earl of *Mulgrave* was Sworn of His Majesty's most Honorable Privy-Council, and accordingly took his place at the Board.

Whitehall, July 26. The Earl of *Stamford*, the Lord *Brandon*, and the Lord *De la mere*, are committed prisoners to the *Tower* for High-Treason.

Whitehall, July 26. The Baron d'*Ebriencamp* Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Mentz*, hath had Audience of their Majesties, being Conducted by Sir *Charles Cotterel* Master of the Ceremonies.

A PROCLAMATION

To Summon in *George Spcake Esq; Francis Charlton Esq; John Wildman Esq; Henry Danvers Esq; commonly called Colonel Danvers, and John Trenchard Esq;*

WHEREAS Warrants have been Issued forth for Apprehending of *George Spcake Esq; Francis Charlton Esq; John Wildman Esq; Henry Danvers Esq; commonly called Colonel Danvers, and John Trenchard Esq;* being Persons Suspected of several Traiterous Practices and Conspiracies against Us and Our Government, and who are fled and do Abscond themselves, on purpose to avoid Our Justice. We therefore, with the advice of Our Council, do Command, Publish, and Declare, by this Our Proclamation, That the said *George Spcake, Francis Charlton, John Wildman, Henry Danvers, and John Trenchard, and every of them, do appear before Us in Our Privy-Council, or do render themselves to one of Our Secretaries of State, or some other of Our Privy-Council, within Twenty days after the Date hereof, upon pain of being Proceeded against for their and his Contempt to Our Royal Commands, according to the Laws of this Our Kingdom.*

Given at Our Court at Whitehall, the 26th day of July, 1685. In the First Year of Our Reign.

From the Imperial Camp before *Newbusef, July, 11.* The Duke of *Lorraine* having, pursuant to the Orders he received from the Emperor, resolved formally to Besiege this place, he sent Orders to the several Troops to march thither from their Quarters, about *Barkan, Lewentz, and Neura.* The Imperialists accordingly arrived here the 7th of this month, the Troops of *Lunenburgh* the 8th, and those of *Bavaria* the 9th. Our Lines of Circumvallation and Contrevallation are finished; and we have begun to raise several Batteries: This day arrived in the Camp part of our Artillery from *Comorra*, and we are expecting the rest from *Vienna*, the whole will consist of 100 Pieces of Cannon and 24 Mortars. The Besieged have made several Sallies to hinder our Works, but were in all of them repulsed with great vigor and bravery; The Garrison, as we are informed, is still about 1800 men, they have suffered very much through want of Provisions which they enjoy more plentifully at present, the Bassa having opened the great Magazine he had all along reserved for the Siege. The Duke of *Lorraine* has commanded the Inhabitants of *Neura*, to provide 100 thousand Fagots, and to bring them to the Camp. There is a report that the Turks, to give us a diversion, intend to attack *Vicegrad* or *Gran.*

Vienna, July 15. The Letters from the Imperial Camp before *Newbusef* of the 13th Instant tell us, that the Lines were finished, and that the 10th Instant as the Christians were raising a Battery, the besieged made a Sally to hinder their Work, but were soon obliged to retire in great disorder; That the Prince de *Commerci*, Prince *Ferdinand de Wirtemberg* and some other Persons of Quality, who are Volun-

tiers in the Army were wounded in this occasion. That the 11th at night the Trenches were opened, that the Baron *de Beck* posted himself within Pistol shot of the Covered-way, and maintained himself there notwithstanding the continual fire of the Besieged; And that two other Attacks would be carried on by the Troops of *Bavaria* and *Lunenburgh.* That the Count *de Rabutz* Commissary General of the Army was arrived in the Camp, who had taken such care that they had plenty of all manner of Provisions. Prince *Waldecke* is arrived here, and will part again in a day or two for *Hungary*, being to command the Troops of the Empire. A great many Vessels pass daily down the *Danube* with Ammunition and Provisions for the Army. The Elector of *Bavaria* is expected here this evening, great preparations being made for his reception.

Cologne, July 23. The Letters from *Vienna* of the 15th Instant give an account that the whole Imperial Army came before *Newbusef* the 7th Instant; The Duke of *Lorraine* accompanied with divers Princes and General Officers, went very near the place to observe it; The Besieged fired upon them with their Cannon, but without doing any execution, and one of their greatest Pieces burst at the first discharge, as they were informed by a Deserter who came out of the place the same day; On the 10th the Besieged made a Sally, in which two or three Persons of Quality were wounded; The 11th the Cannon arrived in the Camp, and the night following the Trenches were opened. The Duke and Dutchess of *Fuliers* are expected here to morrow; They will be received by all the Troops in Garrison here, and by eight Companies of the Burghers in Arms.

Paris, August 1. The King, we are told, has received an account from the *Marschal d'Essee*, that the *Tripolins* having sustained great damage by the Bombs shot into the Town, and fearing the farther effects of them, had at last submitted to the Conditions of Peace he had proposed to them; the chief whereof are, That they shall restore all the Christian Slaves taken under French Colors, and shall pay 500 thousand Livres in Money; And that they had already paid part of this sum; and had delivered to the French 200 Slaves, which were then at *Tripoli.* The *East-India* Company here has adviced of the arrival of two of their Ships at *Port Louis* from the *Indies.* The Letters from *Madrid* tell us, that the Duke *de Villa Hermosa* had desired to be excused from taking upon him the Government of the Spanish Netherlands; for which his Catholick Majesty had named him upon the news of the death of the *Marquis de Grana.*

Bilboa, July 20. About six days since arrived at *St. Andero* a Dutch Frigate of 32 Guns and 80 Men, pretended to be bound from *Amsterdam* to the *West-Indies*, but by bad Weather had in the Bay of *Biscay* sprung a Plank, and wet their Bread, and was forced into that Port for fresh supply, and to stop her Leak. And about four days since came to this Town from on Board the said Ship, the Captain and his Chirurgion, in order to procure Money or Credit for their resetting in *St. Andero*; there came also an Englishman, formerly Master of a Merchant Ship, who pretended he was going Passenger for the *Barbadoes*; and a Scotchman who likewise pretended to be a Passenger;
