WHEREAS the Minister of Health, after giving to the Incumbent and Churchwardens of the Parish of Ashford in Bakewell, in the County of Derby, 10 days' previous notice of his intention in that behalf, has, under the provisions of the Burial Act, 1853, as amended by subsequent enactments, made a Representation to His Majesty in Council that, for the protection of the Public Health, the opening of any new burial ground in the Civil Parish of Ashford in Bakewell, in the said County of Derby, save with the previous approval of the Minister of Health, should be prohibited, and that burials should be discontinued therein as follows, viz.:—

Ashford in Bakewell.—Forthwith and entirely in the Churchyard of the Parish Church of Ashford in the said Parish,

(a) In any vault or walled grave now existing in the said Churchyard, burial may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.
