UMPIRES' CORNER

At the Annual Dinner of the VAFA Umpires' Association Umpires' Adviser, Alan O'Neil, delivered a thought-provoking address on the current state of Australian Rules football. Its theme was the need for a radical overhaul of the rules of the game.

Umpires' Corner this week includes the first two extracts from his address.

TOWARDS THE ELIMINATION OF VICIOUS ACTS

For many years at all levels an important part of games' playing philosophy has been "win at all costs". This inevitably has led to the exploitation of the approach which is epitomised by "see how much you can get away with in the first five minutes and play the rest of the game accordingly".

When this involves something as it did a few years ago like the "flick pass" in Aussie Rules, the situation is not serious and is merely taking advantage of human frailties and perhaps the recognition of individual differences in umpires. When however, it has to do with deliberately and viciously striking an opponent some twenty or more metres behind the play or striking just behind the umpire, the matter is much more serious. Coaches, officials and players, if they really have the game at heart, must realise that cheating in any form, vicious or non-vicious, is firstly an admission on the part of the offender that he is incapable of beating his opponent by superior skills, pace, or honest and fair tactics and secondly that there is no difference between a player striking another player when he doesn't

expect it and one citizen delivering a king-hit against another citizen.

In law both are examples of assault and battery. In any civilised society they must be recognised as examples of extreme cowardice. Many coaches, players, officials and spectators confuse that sort of behaviour with playing the game hard. The rules entrust the umpire with the authority and power to deal with every other type of infringement of the laws of the game, it would be a most progressive step to give him the authority to deal with this in Aussie Rules as is provided in that other code.

The situation is made even more distressing by the fact that the players traditionally and almost universally adopt the philosophy of the criminal and prefer to cop it sweet.

Played hard, fairly and within the letter and spirit of the fans of the game, Aussie Rules is a fantastic game to play and a thrilling game to watch. The player who is fit and skilful enough does not need to cheat. Any player who is not fit enough and not skilful enough to be confident he can win fairly or is so emotionally unstable that he cannot control his temper should not be playing. Aussie Rules is a tremendous game for the skilful and courageous participants, not for cowards and cheats.

Aussie Rules should provide for the development of fit, courageous, skilful and fair-minded young men who will delight in their own ability and give delight to those who watch them in action. These are lofty words and high, which will doubtless occasion some smiles and sniggers, but the honest truth contained therein cannot be easily dimmed.

PREVIEWING TODAY'S GAMES

A SECTION Preliminary Final

Sunday is the day for De La Salle to meet the determined Ormond in the Preliminary Final. De La Salle were not disgraced last week against University Blues and looked set for a berth in the Grand Final with a week's rest between, however they capitulated with a moment or two to go. Ormond fought back, two weeks ago, to win over St. Bernard's, after trailing all day and by no means have they given up the hope of making the grand final.

The conditions for the last two Saturdays have been blustery and so, generally, the games have been one-ended affairs. I can see this game being a battle of the back-lines also, with Mike Greene and Brian Bourke a spring-board from the half-back line for De La Salle and Greg Fisher, Chris McAsey and Philip Mehrten forming the back-line nucleus for Ormond.

Neither one side nor the other relies on one person only to kick goals although both have a player in the top five goal-kickers for A Section. Robert Ruffolo has 64 to his credit for De La Salle while Bruce Bourne has 43 for Ormond. These boys will both have to be watched by the opposition so as not to let them loose.

The small division for Ormond were all in the best players at their last outing, led by Greg Pearce and Glen Casey and they will again give great drive for their side. Captain Ralph McHenry was dominant in the centre for De La Salle last week and well backed-up by their ruckman Peter Donegan.

Last year De La Salle lost the 2nd Semi-final to Uni Blues and went on to win the Preliminary and Grand Finals. Coach Gavin White will certainly get their minds on the job again this week and I think they will do the same as in 1979. Ormond's coach Peter Murphy will have a hard time to contain the all-round strength of De La Salle.

B SECTION Preliminary Final

Today on the wide expanses of the University Oval the experience and physical size of Old Scotch will vie with Kew Keeness and its quality, fleet footed smaller players.

One decisive area in which I expect Scotch to gain early ascendancy is the ruck duels. Ex Scotch Collegian "Munro" Walker, thirteen times named among Kew's best players, will have no respite from the persistence and endeavours of Tom Mason and the Nomadic Mike Bates whose long lay off has not dimmed his talent. Scotch ruck ascendancy will limit the opportunities offering to Rocco Zerbi and Joey Busuttill. Star Kew ruck-rover Bruce

Smith will have the onerous task of stopping Scotch ball movements around the ground. Pivot duels between veterans Ross Duke (Scotch) and Don Fletcher could also be decisive. Each of these players is a potential match winner. Scotch because of their greater height could well afford to leave a ruckman hovering near Fletcher. Kew cannot afford to do the same!

Scotch has a potentially volatile forward line, rich in experience and talent. Veteran John Morgan doesn't need many opportunities to become a match winner. Cox, Sherwen, Polkinghorne and Anderson are a quartet whose talents could well signal victory to Scotch. Kew's defence, led by dependable Ken Rowlands and skipper Terry Hayes will have to remain alert to hold the Scotch players. Once pressure is applied constantly as happened last week, the Scotch forwards are not nearly so damaging as they are if allowed latitude. Whether Kew defenders can apply the necessary pressure remains to be seen.

Key Scotch defenders Bob Drummond and Alexander as well as their flankers will all be busy preventing prolific Kew forwards Chris Haralambopolous, Wayne Blay and the chastened Brett Burden kicking a winning score. It is my belief the Scotch defenders can contain Kew to a losing total.

Another decisive factor favouring Old Scotch is their great final's experience in A and B Sections — Twelve of today's side played in the 1978 A Section Premiership side. Many of these players also played in the 1977 B Section Premiership side.

Final's football is vastly different from minor round games but form, skill and experience all point to an Old Scotch victory today.

C SECTION Grand Final

Although my selection in this section last week was correct, much to the disgust of Frank Luscombe from the B-T's, I failed miserably with the other sections and look like winning my second wooden spoon for the season.

At long last we have reached the grand final and on July 19th I predicted that Old Brighton Grammarians and Geelong would play off in this game, and rightly so as they each finished five games clear of the B-T's in third Place. It will be a star studded event with many players of interstate experience.

"Jumping" John Priestley is the leading goalkicker for both the Section and the Association while Tony Gedye proved his worth as a ruckman in Adelaide, and David Shepherd was part of the 1978 interstate squad with Gary Jones. The only interstate representative from Geelong is Greg Neilson

but he is well backed up by the experienced Trevaskis and Linke.

There have been stories that Brighton can handle Geelong provided the game is in Melbourne. This type of thinking plus the similarity of Elsternwick Park to Queen's Park will be sufficient incentive for Geelong to turn on the type of football that is needed in finals. Brighton have gained promotion to B Section and I think they will relax now and Geelong will beat them for the third time.

D SECTION Grand Final

Last Saturday's 73 point win by State Bank over St. Bede's gave them promotion to C Section in 1981 and the right to play off for the Premiership against Alphington today.

It will be interesting to see if State Bank can maintain their tremendous finals' form or if the two games, even though they were won easily, have taken too much out of them.

In their finals' wins State Bank got going from the first bounce due to the ruckwork of Maher who was backed up by ruck-rovers Wright and Eacott and the smaller players in Bennett, Owen and Ingils. With all these players providing constant drive from the square to the forward line, Jenkins and his co-forwards took great delight in converting these opportunities into goals.

Whilst Alphington may not have a "knock" ruckman to match State Bank, they do have players who are more than capable of matching their opponents once the ball is in general play. Gary Vallance in the centre has been a star player all year. Ruck-roller Nichol and rover Evans (re-recruited from Parkside mid-season) are ball-hungry and are consistently "sharking" the ball at centre bounces. The versatile "all-rounder" Bannister has been a good player this year, whether ruck-rolling, up forward, or defending. As can be expected, with all these players putting the ball quickly up into attack, full-forward Holmes and half-forward Hoekins have had a picnic this year and each has got a bag full of goals.

Both sides have also had good wing players this year — Skerry (Alphington); Brennan (State Bank) — and it is going to be the side whose players around the centre square get on top of their opponents that will have a big say in the outcome of this match.

With both sides having key forwards that are capable of winning the game off their own boots, the pressure will be on the backmen. Alphington's veteran Gale has been playing extremely well at full-back and he looks capable of holding Jenkins. He will receive spirited support from his fellow defenders in Shaw and Dooley, who will have to be on their toes to cover Rosewarne and the resting "on the ball" players.

State Bank's defence has its own veteran in Wynd, who has come back well from injury to be playing at his top. He will be the steadying influence for Cloke, Wright and

Lenehan, who will want to play their respective opponents very closely and cut off the opposition players who come charging out of the square.

Looking back at the home-and-away games, State Bank, after getting a five goal lead by half-time, held on to beat Alphington by two points; but in the second game it was all over at half-time with Alphington leading by eleven goals to one.

If State Bank are to win today, they will have to do what they have done in the previous two finals — get the initial break on their opponents and keep possession of the ball for the rest of the game. I think that Alphington will have learnt from their semi-final against St. Bede's, when they gave them a start. So after their week's rest and a whole season of consistent performances behind them, they will go out and win the 1980 Flag today.

E SECTION Grand Final

Not a great deal to add to my comments of a fortnight ago: I believe that St. Pius will make it the treble for the year by defeating West Brunswick for the third time and thereby taking the Premiership. West Brunswick are still not back to their top, despite a good first half last week and I doubt that they will have the capacity to handle the better forwards of St. Pius such as Skerry. It will be a close and hard game, but the slight edge in skill will give St. Pius the flag.

F SECTION Grand Final

Thomastown have had a week's rest whilst the Red's had another heart stopper against Peninsula. The wind last week made any game, or the players, liable for prosecution under the Gaming Act for participating in a game of chance but the Red's managed to see it out. This should stand them in good stead today and enable them to even the score with Thomastown. Both teams have done very well this season and merit their promotion.

Op's have been there before from memory, but certainly not for some years. Therry O.B. must be wondering why all their fortunes desert them at this time of the season. It is a shame because they certainly deserve promotion. Perhaps a little more concentration and dedication will see them there in 1982.

Countback Gives "A" Section Best and Fairest to Bernie Angel



The "A" Section Best and Fairest voting this year saw St. Bernard's elusive centreman Bernie Angel win on a countback from Michael Yeo of University Blues. Both players polled 22 votes, with Bernie scoring 6 (3 votes) and Mike 3.

This win caps off an award-studded career for Bernie who, at 26 years of age stands 175 cm (5'10") tall and weighs in at only 67 kg (10½ stone).

He joined St. Bernard's straight from school in 1972 and played in the Under 19 premiership side of that year and won the B and F award for that Under 19 side. In 1973 he graduated to the senior side and won the B and F there — and was runner-up in the "A" Section vote, behind Paul Peasnell of North Old Boys. Bernie has been placed in the top four in the Club's B and F in each of his six years with St. Bernard's.

Between 1977 and 1979, Bernie played with Macedon and continued his good form there by being placed in the Riddell and District B and F in his first year.

He has now played 110 games with St. Bernard's, mainly in the centre but occasionally he has lined up on a half-forward flank.

The hallmark of Bernie's game is speed — which is perhaps understandable considering that he was at one stage Victorian Junior 400 m. champion. He uses this running ability to clear away from his opponent on numerous occasions during a game — as his "25 kicks plus hand-passes", on average, testify.

Congratulations Bernie on a fine season.

Mark Hibbins — "B" Section Best and Fairest



The winner of the B Section Best and Fairest for Season 1980 is Collegians' blond ruck-rover Mark Hibbins. He was two points clear of Old Scotch ruckman Tom Mason, with Rocco Zerbi of Kew a further two points away in third place.

Mark first played with Collegians whilst still attending school at Wesley College in 1978. He joined the Old Boys' side in earnest the following year and has now played 40 games — mostly with the Seniors. His normal playing position is as a ruck-rover, but in the first semi-final this year he played at centre-half back and was still named among the best players.

Though naturally a right-footer, Mark has developed his ability to kick with either foot, and has added to this the skill of being able to hand-pass with either hand. He frequently uses this hand-passing ability to create forward moves from virtually nothing for Collegians.

Mark's ball-handling abilities and his creative, unselfish play are, indeed, the hallmarks of his football, as his average of 25 to 30 possessions per game indicates.

Whilst following in the footsteps of his father Lex and uncle Geoff Hibbins, Mark is certainly not relying on past reputations. He is determined to make his own impression — as indicated by his being awarded Collegians' Seniors Best First Year Player in 1979 and by his gaining interstate selection for the V.A.F.A. this year.

Congratulations on your win Mark, and may you continue to enhance Amateur Football for many years to come.

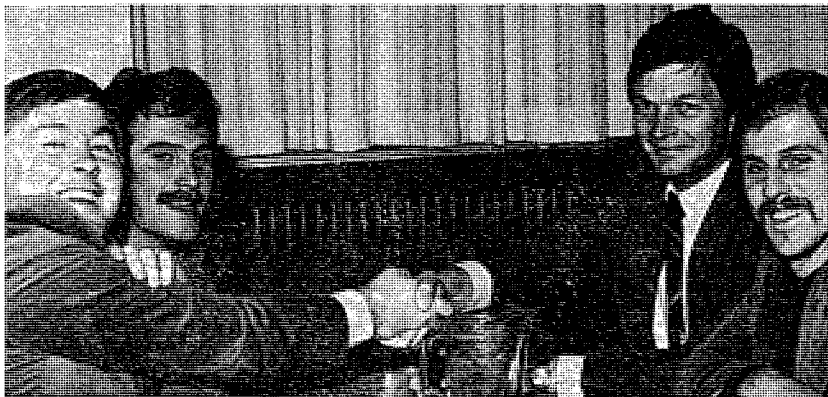
